FINE MEETING FOR THE GOVT.

Shediac, N. B., Oct. 1.—"The Foster government is certain of victory and it is nonsense for the opposition to talk of overthrowing it," said Hon. Mr. Veniot at the meeting in the interests of the government ticket. The Foster government, he added, had no quarrel with the United Farmers. Would the farmers accept J. B. M. Baxter as their leader? Mr. Veniot said no one could cite a single case in which the Foster government had turned down a reasonable request of the farmers.

The minister said that if he made big road expenditures it was at the expense of the automobile owners and the increase in automobiles showed the people were ready to pay for improved roads. This year he was spend-

ing \$450,000 of automobile money on by-roads and would spend the same amount next year. Automobile owners were now helping the farmers to get good roads.

Hon. Dr. Smith.

Hon. Dr. Smith said the old government had not been collecting stumpage dues on sixty per cent of the lumber cut on the crown lands. But the present government by organizing an effective system of collection was now securing stumpage on 100 per cent of the cut. This year the stumpage would be \$1,220,000 and the total territorial revenue \$1,500,000. Dr. Smith could not see why the farmers should want to oust the best government New Brunswick has had since confederation. In no country were the farmers so free of taxes. Our farmers did not pay one-fifth the taxes Quebec farmers paid.

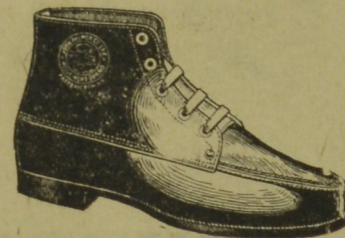

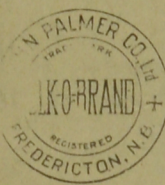
