A NEW PHASE OF THE POTATO SCANDAL BROUGHT TO LIGHT

An Explanation as to Why Potatoes Bought from W. W. Boyce Were Shipped to Cuba With the Government Stock—Were Placed on Top of the Cargo to Hoodwink the Cubans.

Although the sordid tale in connection with the purchase and disposal of patriotic potatoes by the old government was pretty well ventilated before a Royal Commission and in the press it seems that there was one feature in connection with the transaction which has only recently come to light. It came out in evidence that on one occasion when the agricultural department was making a shipment to Cuba a carload of potatoes was purchased from Mr. W. W. Boyce of this city and sent along with the "surplus stock." Mr. P. J. Hughes the Government Counsel naturally had his curiosity aroused as to why the government with such a large quantity of surplus potatoes on hand, found it necessary to purchase a further supply from Mr. Boyce. He questioned Mr. Daggett on the subject but the latter could not remember whether Mr. Boyce had made the shipment on his own responsibility or whether the potatoes had been purchased by the department. Here is an extract from the evidence:

Mr. Hughes—I gathered from your evidence when you were here before that your statement was that Mr. Boyce was sending down a shipment on his own responsibility, along with your cargo. Do you still adhere to that, or was Mr. Boyce merely selling you a carload of potatoes?

Mr. Daggett—I wouldn't be sure just how we shipped them. Whether we bought them or whether we shipped them in his own responsibility, anyway I considered we were responsible to him for the potatoes and paid him.

Mr. Hughes—That is you had to pay him whether you lost or not?

Mr. Daggett—That is my recollection of it, and I think that is his. We were anxious to save freight.

Mr. Hughes—And you practically went and bought another carload of potatoes to go along with the rest.

By the Commissioner—I understood you to say when you were here last that the reason you paid for them was that they were on the top of the cargo and turned out all right, and you simply handed over the money.

Mr. Daggett—I think that is correct.

Mr. Hughes—They were sent to your consignees were they not?

Mr. Daggett—I think so.

Mr. Boyce Was Wise.

Mr. Hughes—Did not Mr. Boyce say he wouldn't ship down on his own responsibility potatoes with a cargo that was defective as this cargo was.

Mr. Daggett—I don't remember him saying anything like that.

Was Promptly Paid.

The Government paid the freight and duty on Mr. Boyce's potatoes and promptly turned over to him the sum of \$401.60. Why were these potatoes purchased from Mr. Boyce? It was because the Government was shipping a cargo of rotten potatoes to Cuba and thought it desirable to place some good ones on the top with the hope that the Cubans would be bamboozled into taking the lot. The whole transaction was as rotten as the potatoes. It was a camouflage game pure and simple. The men who tried to pull off this disgraceful deal are now seeking

to hoodwink the electorate of New Brunswick by an effort to hide a lot of crooked politicians beneath a few honest farmer candidates.

The Cubans refused to fall for the potato deal and the people of New Brunswick will be just as hard to hoodwink.




