## MUST KILL THE KICK IN PERFUMERY

Topeka, Kan., Feb. 24.—Warren W. Wilson, chief Federal prohibition inspector for Kansas, has sent out notices to the druggists of the state that they must treat all toilet preparations before sale so that the articles cannot be used for beverage purposes.

"We had numerous complaints from near Camp Funston and Fort Riley that some of the soldiers were getting quite boisterous from some sort of liquor," Mr. Wilson said. "Investigation showed they were buying toilet waters, perfumes and bay rum and using these instead of whiskey and

brandy and other liquors.

"Many druggists do not seem to realize the requirements of the act to enforce prohibition, requiring all toilet preparations for external use shall be treated with tartar emetic before being sold. The manufacturers have been required to treat their products before shipment, but the ruling also applies to the stocks now in the hands of the druggists and department stores. The use of these articles after being treated is likely to produce entirely unexpected action upon the drinker, for there is sufficient emetic to cause real suffering for a few minutes. There is a 'kick' in toilet water and bay rum that wasn't there before."

Fergus, Ont., Feb. 23.—Hon. W. E. Raney attorney-general of Ontario, was officially declared elected by acclamation to the constituency of East Wellington, succeeding Albert Heller, at 1 o'clock today.

## IMPORTANT CHANGES IN LAW URGED

Toronto, Feb. 24.—Representatives of the Ontario Municipal Association waited on Hon. H. C. Nixon (Provincial Secretary yesterday and placed before him several requests for changes in the laws. One of these was that an optional system of municipal government for cities and towns of the Province be provided, to consist of the Council, a City Manager and a board comprising the Mayor and such of the permanent officials as the Council might appoint, with similar authority to Boards of Control in large cities.

Another resolution presented asked the Legislature to secure a report on improvement of the present municipal system which will best conform to Ontario ideals of government and satisfy modern standards, either through commission government or some other method.

A change was also asked to enable municipalities to levy taxes on the fear in which the assessment is made so as to avoid the loss which now results through citizens removing from the city or town.

## TREATY TO BE THE CHIEF ISSUE IN THE U. S.

Washington, Feb. 23.—Events of the last few days have convinced the leaders of both parties in Congress that the German peace treaty with the covenant of the League of Nations, cannot be avoided as the chief issue in the forthcoming Presidential campaign.

The optimism with which Senators on both sides who want the treaty ratified in some form approached the reconsideration of the instrument has faded. Ratification is admitted by Democrats and Republicans alike to be more improbable now than at any time since the discussion began last summer.

The complete failure of Senator Lodge (Mass) Republican leader and Senator Hitchcock, (Neb.), acting Democratic leader, to obtain anything like enough votes to insure the adoption of their respective compromise reservations on Article X of the League covenant was the first great blow. President Wilson's threat to withdraw both the German and the Anglo-French-American treaties from the Senate because of the attitude of the Entente premiers in the Fiume settlement has all but ended hope for ratification.

The much heralded debate on the treaty came to a standstill in the Senate today the Senators devoting their time to other matters.

Although President Wilson has declared that the treaty should be made a campaign issue, rather than be ratified with the Lodge reservations and the "irreconcilables" have cheerfully accepted his challenge, the bulk of the Republican and Democratic membership of the Senate favors ratification now upon the best basis possible. But the stand of the extremists on both sides makes this apparently impossible.

There is a growing feeling in the Senate that President Wilson is deliberately endeavoring to bring about a situation which will make it necessary for the candidates of both parties to take a definite stand on the treaty in the Presidential campaign. There is even the suggestion among the Democrats that Mr. Wilson himself may be considering the possibility that he may be the logical candidate to succeed himself on this issue. All of his actions are regarded as pointing in that direction and his failure to remove himself as a candidate for a third term in the face of the well known desire of other Democrats to get the nomination at San Francisco adds to the political complication.

## FEED AFFECTS THE COLOR AND FLAVOR OF EGGS

In extreme cases the flavor and odor of the feed have been imparted to the egg. Onions have been fed in sufficient quantity to bring about this effect. Those who desire to produce a first class article should not give feeds of high and objectionable flavor to their flocks.

In no case should tainted feed be allowed to enter the ration. Feed also has an influence on the color of the yolk. Corn fed exclusively will give a deep yellow or highly colored yolk while wheat fed alone will produce a much lighter yolk. A fairly high colored yolk is usually preferred and can usually be obtained by feeding a moderate amount of corn. Plenty of green feed also enriches the color of the yolk.
