RECIPES BY MARION HOLMES.

Kidneys a la Tartare.

Broil five or six kidneys. Put them on a hot dish. Serve the following sauce, which should be already prepared before broiling kidneys. Beat the yolk of an egg for two or three minutes. Add very gradually in drops at first, six teaspoons oil, and then one of tarragon vinegar. Beat the mixture well between every addition or the oil will float on top. Repeat until the sauce is of the consistency of thick cream. Four tablespoons oil, one of vinegar will be about the quantity required.

Add a pinch of salt, a small pinch of cayenne, a tablespoon of French mustard, five or six gherkins, three shallots, finely minced, a teaspoon each of chopped chervil, tarragon and burnet, also a half teaspoon chili vinegar. Put a teaspoon of this sauce in the hollow of each kidney; send the rest to table in sauce boat. Time for kidneys about six or seven minutes, three-quarters of an hour to prepare sauce, sufficient for four or five persons

Hindu Curried Potatoes.

Cut two large potatoes in cubes about an inch square, place in saucepan with one tablespoonful of melted butter. Season to taste with salt, cayenne pepper and one teaspoonful of curry powder. Stir thoroughly, then add one pint of hot water. Let cook till potatoes are well done but not mushy. Leave enough liquid to form a gravy when they are served. If you like a milk sauce, an East Indian would put one-eighth cupful of milk in a bowl, add one-half cupful of cold water, and with his fingers he would blend in two teaspoonfuls of corn flour. Pour this over the potatoes and cook till quantity of liquor is reduced about half way.

Coffee Cake.

Mix and sift one pint of flour, one and a half teaspoons baking powder, one half teaspoon salt and rub into it two tablespoons butter. Add one egg beaten and enough milk to make a thick batter. Spread one inch deep in greased shallow tin. If you want it plain just sprinkle thickly with sugar and cinnamon; if liked put sliced apples over the top with sugar and cinnamon.

Corn Toast.

Toast stale slices of bread. Put two tablespoonfuls of butter into a saucepan with one tablespoonful of chopped onion and cook for three minutes stirring constantly. Add two tablespoonfuls of flour, then stir in two cupfuls milk and bring to boiling point. To this add a can of corn, one well beaten egg, three-quarter teaspoonful salt and a little pepper. Spread the toast with butter and arrange it on a hot platter and pour the corn mixture over it.

THE FALCONS IN TORONTO

Toronto, May 16—Toronto gave the Falcons of Winnipeg a gala send-off when they started for Antwerp in quest of the Olympic hockey title, and Toronto will welcome them back as the world's champions that they are when they arrive Monday. The Sports men's Patriotic Association in conjunction with the Mayor and Board of Control, Olympic Committee, President, Vice-President, and Treasurer of the O. H. A., and Sheriff Paxton of the C. A. H. A. will undertake to show the Western wonders what sportsmen and the public generally think of them and their performances overseas.

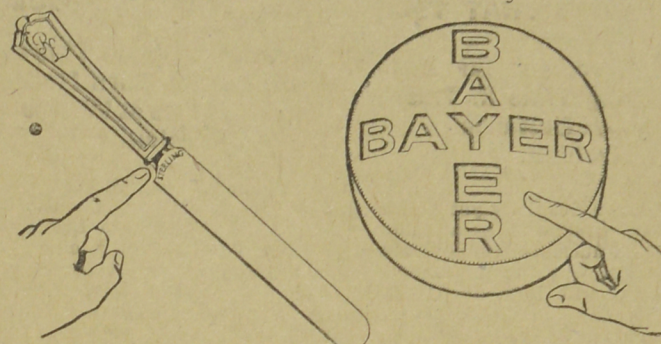
The champions will be met upon their arrival early on Monday morning. They will be tendered a civic reception at the City Hall after a visit to the Legislature. The players will be presented by the Sportsmen with silver-mounted canes suitably engraved. The joint committee will entertain the Winnipeggers at a private luncheon at noon. In the afternoon they will be shown over the great harbor improvement scheme and taken to the Island Stadium, where they will be the guests of the Toronto Baseball Club. They will occupy boxes draped with their colors. At 6.30 the City of Toronto will tender the Falcons a complimentary dinner at the King Edward Hotel, and in the evening the champions will attend the boxing bouts at the Arena. On Tuesday the Icelanders will go to Niagara Falls.

New York, May 16—Sir Thomas Lipton's challenger for the America's Cup, Shamrock IV, will be launched, according to present plans, Monday. Charles Nicholson the designer, who is due here Friday, will inspect the hull of the Lipton yacht before she is sent into the water. 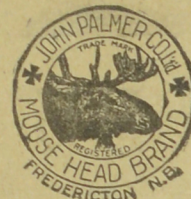

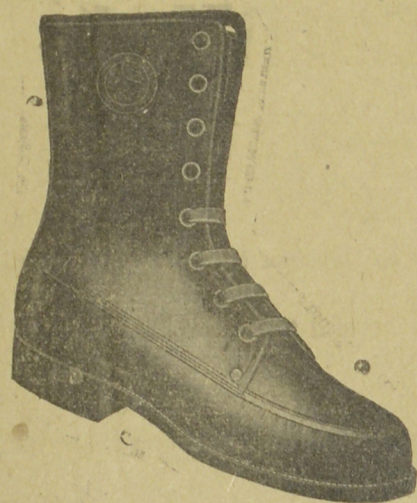
