WEALTHY MAN GETS PRISON SENTENCE

Detroit, Mich. March 6.—Grant Hugh Browne, New York clubman, race track man and millionaire, and Major Raoul Waterbury, were admitted to bail yesterday afternoon pending the filing of writs of error by their counsel after Judge Tuttle in Federal court had sentenced Browne to serve two years, and Waterbury 18 months, in the Federal prisons at Leavenworth, for conspiring to defraud the Government in the purchase of army salvage. Sentence of Setarius Nicholson, the third defendant found guilty in the army graft case, was postponed until March 22, and his present bonds continued.

Postponement of Nicholson's sentence followed a lengthy conference between Judge Tuttle, United States District Attorney Kinnane, Levi Cook,

RENT PROFITEERS IN CALIFORNIA ARE SCORED

Charged With Driving Visitors Away From Popular Winter
Resort—Rents Have Been Boosted Beyond All Reason by
Rapacious Landlords, Who Seem to Have Been Seized
by a Sudden Greed for Profit.

The Times recently printed an important news item to the effect that the Santa Fe had added another section to one of its eastbound passenger trains. The reason for this addition is apparent; the eastbound tourist rush has begun, and six weeks earlier than ever before. In former years the tourists came West during the whole of February and did not begin to scatter to the North and the East until late in March. What has driven so many of them back into the lap of winter this year? Ask that question of the grasping, profiteering landlord and apartment-house keeper. They have done an incalculable injury to the reputation of Los Angeles as a winter resort.

Letters come to the Times by the counsel for Nicholson, and the accused, in the privacy of the judge's chamber.

Mr. Cook asked the court to dismiss the verdict against his client, advancing reasons, which he declined to make public. They are understood to have been of more import than the fact that Nicholson had made a complete confession after his arrest, and had testified against the other defendants on trial. Mr. Cook's request was opposed by the District Attorney. Sentence was imposed on Browne and Waterbury on the two indictments charging them with conspiracy to defraud and conspiracy in an attempt to bribe a Government official. Browne was given two years on each count, the terms to run concurrently. Waterbury's sentence of 18 months on each charge was also placed concurrently.

single inside room; an instance where in a school-teacher who had been paying \$25 a month rent for a small room found that rental boosted by a brutal landlord to \$75 and she did not know where to go. Such a practice is nothing less than legalized robbery. And in most cases called to our attention the managers of hotels and apartment houses where the rents were unjustifiably raised held long term leases. The lessees are not paying a dollar more than they paid last year, or will pay next year; but they have taken advantage of the shortage in houses to double and treble their rents. Such action is plain, bald profiteering.

The Times regrets that no method has yet been devised for singling out these rent hogs and holding them up to public obloquy. As long as they remain anonymous they will continue their practice and the innocent will not be able to escape suspicion for having shared in the guilt. We are all aware, however that when public opinion becomes focused on some indefensible practice in Los Angeles a way is generally found to expose the perpetrators and to punish them for their evil deeds. It may be possible to expose those who have made unfair profits out of rentals of subrentals, just as a way was found to expose those who were so disloyal or parsimonious that they would not purchase Liberty Bonds.

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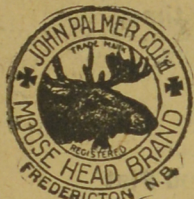
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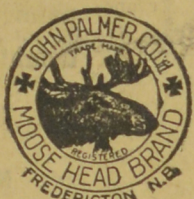
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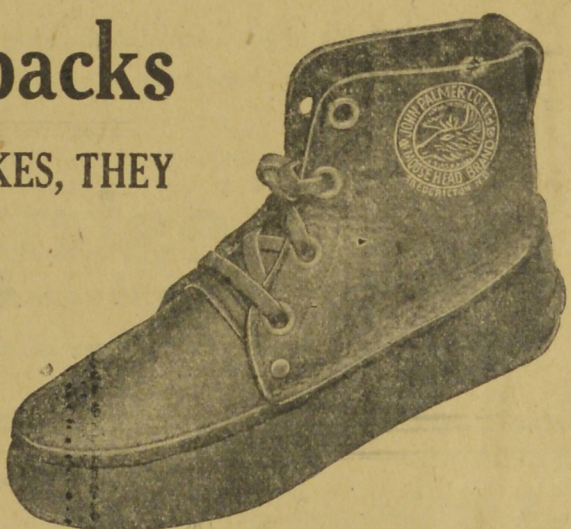
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
