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

Hope springs eternal in the breasts of those whose sons, sweethearts or husbands vanished in the late tornado which swept loved ones so far and wide.



He might lose reason and memory under the terrible stress of war and wander around helpless to find those who belong to him.

It is reported today that there is likely to be a cross bench party in the Legislature during the coming session. At the opposition convention in St. John last fall Hon, J. A. Murray resigned the leadership of that party and after the position had been offered to two others and declined with thanks in each case the honor was again conferred on Hon. Mr. Murray, He was absent from the convention at the time and an adjournment was made before any word was received from him .Whether or not he has since accepted is a matter on which the public has not been informed.




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
