## GOVERNMENT SUSTAINED BY A MAJORITY OF THIRTY-FOUR

### Mr. Rowell's Reply

In the evening with the galleries crowded to the limit of their capacity Hon. Mr. Rowell replied to the attack which had lasted from 3.15 until 6 o'clock in the afternoon. For one hour and fifteen minutes the minister made answer to the charges of the member for Russell, and then took his seat amid thunderous applause.

"I sought to do my duty as I saw it in the best interests of my country in her hour of need," said Mr. Rowell, adding that he left any decision as between himself and Mr. Murray to the house and to the country.

Many of the attacks were entirely of a personal nature, he said, and these he did not propose to answer. Those which affected his public life he dealt with briefly and thoroughly. To the charge that he had been enriched from a prohibition fund and other similar sources, he replied that he had never received a dollar in any such way.

Mr. Murphy had implied that he sought to divert the income tax in Toronto. That was as baseless as the rest of his statements. "I challenge any man to point to one statement which reflects on French-Canadians or Roman Catholics," declared Mr. Rowell adding that the member for Russell had become a political lackey the Ripper, who, when he could not attack one of his opponents, stood ready to turn his knife against one on his own side of the house.

In seeking any one for public posi-

tions, the minister asserted, he had always looked to the man's qualifications and not to his race or religion "and not all the ecclesiastics in all the churches of Canada could make me depart from what I see to be my duty."

As to the Union government, it has all the vindication it needed in its support of Canadian soldiers in the field, and the success with which it had handled things at home. The people were united behind it, and they could be trusted today as at any other time.

Ernest Lapointe, Quebec East, who followed Mr. Rowell, said the Unionists were trying to screen themselves behind the illness of the prime minister and the Liberals intended to call for a show down.

Hon. Martin Burrell followed Mr. Lapointe. Mr. Burrell spoke of the esteem in which Mr. Rowell was held by his colleagues in the cabinet. Mr. Burrell declared that he could not conceive a speech more calculated than that of Mr. Murphy to thwart the purpose for which the Liberal party was formed.

Mr. Burrell said the amendment was couched in unfortunate language. It was more than an ordinary want of confidence vote.

Referring to the farmer movement, the minister of customs said the campaigns being carried on by the farmers' organizations in the different provinces made it clear that this was purely a class movement.

Discussing the Saar Valley commission, Mr. Burrell said that R. D. Waugh of Winnipeg, representative of the British Empire on the commission has been appointed to the chairmanship of the commission.

This is the first intimation from any member of the government of this appointment, which was rumored in recent despatches from Winnipeg. R. H. Halbert, of North Ontario, one of the newly elected farmer members observed that the farmer movement was not a class organization. He pleaded for national unity; and Horatio Hocken declared that one of the presumed orange articles read by Mr. Murphy, bore none of the earmarks of the orange association. "I venture to say that this document," Mr. Hocken added, was printed either in Nova Scotia or in the province of Quebec." Mr. Hocken said amid laughter from French Canadian members, that the province of Quebec was ruled by ecclesiastics.

## REV. MR. BAIRD RESIGNS HIS PASTORATE

Rev. L. E. Ackland occupied the pulpit of St. Paul's church on Sunday morning. At the conclusion of his sermon he read a communication from Rev. M. J. McPherson, moderator of the St. John Presbytery, announcing the resignation of Rev. Frank Baird as pastor of St. Paul's church.

Mr. Baird accepted a call to the church here between eight and nine years ago, and since that time his faithfulness and devotion to duty has won for him a high regard in the hearts of the members of his congregation. As a minister he was ever mindful of the wants of the sick and the needy, and was a regular visitor to the Fisher Memorial Hospital.

Since he came to town he has exemplified the best type of citizenship, having thrown himself with energy into every movement tending to the uplift of the community. Always interested in the cultural side of education, his addresses at the annual school closing were valuable contributions to the thought of the community. In this respect he will be greatly missed. He was with us during the sad years of the great war and he did his utmost to aid the recruiting movement and to assist in laying before the public Canada's vital interest in the outcome of the great struggle. He was also one of the first to lend a helping hand to the organization of the Fisher Memorial Library, and was one of the original members of the governing board. In fact any and every movement of any kind towards the betterment of conditions and the development of the community life met with his hearty approval and his energetic assistance. His removal from Woodstock will be a distinct loss to the citizenship and it will be very difficult to fill his place.
