## MANY PEOPLE WERE KILLED BY TORNADO IN THE WEST

Swept Over Portion of States of Illinois, Indiana and Wisconsin—Property Loss Expected to Run Into the Millions—Many Buildings Were Demolished, and One Hundred Persons are Reported Injured.

Chicago, March 28—At least thirty dead, hundreds of injured and a property loss of several million dollars were left in the wake of a tornado that swept North Eastern Illinois and portions of Indiana, Missouri and Wisconsin.

Elgin, the western outskirts of Chicago and North Shore and western suburbs were in the path of the storm which destroyed hundreds of buildings, uprooted trees, and demoralized railroad traffic and telegraphic and telephone communication before dying out on the shore of Lake Michigan just north of Chicago.

The fury of the tornado was felt chiefly at Elgin and Melrose Park, a Chicago suburb. Eight were killed and more than 100 injured at the former city, thirty-six miles west of Chicago, and the property loss there was estimated at \$4,000,000.

At Melrose Park seven were killed and four were reported missing.

In Chicago proper two persons were killed and a score injured, while at

Dunning, a north western suburb, four deaths were reported, more than a hundred were injured and 1,000 made homeless.

### The Damage

Chicago, March 28—A score of persons were killed and hundreds more injured today in a tornado that swept the country and several towns north and west of Chicago and ravaged some of the city's northwestern suburbs. The property damage ran into millions of dollars, including the demolition of many buildings and the razing of telegraph and telephone lines. Communication with the rural regions was for a time cut off.

The Aurora, Elgin and Chicago Electric Railway officials said one of their motormen reported that the tornado centred in the heart of Elgin.

An Associated Press correspondent en route to Elgin filed a special from Wilmette, Ill., that Wilmette and other north shore towns were hit by a tornado and that several persons were hurt at Wilmette. All the houses on one street in Wilmette were reported blown down.

Fifteen persons were killed by the tornado in Melrose Park, a suburb of Chicago, according to reports received here. A number of buildings were said to have been blown down.

A report from Evanston, Ill., north of Chicago, said a church had been badly damaged and several persons injured.

### Six Persons Killed

Elgin Ills. March 28—Six persons are reported killed in a tornado which struck this city today. The Congregational church the opera house and the G. M. Peck store in the central business district, were destroyed and many other mercantile establishments badly damaged.

### Town Wiped Out

Fort Wayne, Ind., March 28—It is reported here that the town of Edgerton Ind., eighteen miles east of here has been completely wiped out by the storm. It is also reported that two men were killed at Zulu, ten miles east of here and that the town has been destroyed.

### Twelve Dead

Atlanta, Ga., March 28—At least twelve persons were killed in a tornado that struck Lagrange, Ga., late today, according to word received here tonight.

A telephone report said some estimates placed the dead as high as thirty. The court house and churches were being used as hospitals.

The town was left in darkness as the light and power plant was damaged and the water works also went out of commission.

The greatest loss of life and property was in the hillside mills region where the tornado smashed nearly everything in its path.

Estimates were that from one hundred to three hundred small residences were destroyed or damaged.

The Atlanta and West Point Railroad reported that passenger train No. 36 from New Orleans had not been located. It was reported no relief train could be sent from here. No. 36, the New York Limited was supposed to be running late and it was not known whether it had passed Lagrange tonight. All wires are down.

### Mock Parliament

With all due pomp and ceremony the Parliament of the Commonwealth of the University of New Brunswick was brought to a close for this year on Saturday night. Many important bills have been passed which should do much to improve conditions on the hill. After the closing session an impromptu dance was held in the lower hall. Music was supplied by a twelve piece jazz orchestra composed of college talent.
