

DIVORCE IS GRANTED IN THE M'DONALD CASE

EVIDENCE TAKEN UNDER COMMISSION IS READ

Application for Hearing in the McCavour and Kincade Cases at St. John—Decision Next Sitting.

The adjourned session of the Divorce Court was held this morning. His Honor Judge Crockett presiding.

G. Earle Logan, of St. John for the plaintiff in McCavour vs McCavour and Kincade vs Kincade applied on affidavits to have the cases heard in St. John in July next on the ground that a great hardship would ensue if the trials were held in any other place.

His Honor said that he had made a rule to hold his court in Fredericton only, but in cases where extreme hardships followed he would try the causes elsewhere. He ordered the affidavits to be filed and will render his decision on the opening day of the next court.

Divorce Granted.

In McDonald vs McDonald G. Hazen Adair of Sussex read the evidence of a witness taken under commission during recess. The court granted a divorce a vinculo matrimonii.

The McDonald case was from King's County. The co-respondent is the plaintiff husband's father. The evidence taken by commission was that of the plaintiff's mother who is an invalid. It was to the effect that acts of infidelity had taken place at her home between her husband and her son's wife.

Court adjourned sine die.

FRESHET MAY CAUSE HEAVY ICE DAMAGE

RIVER IS RISING FAST AND ICE IS VERY HEAVY

Wilmot Park and Queen's Sq. Sections Both Suffered on Sunday from Surface Water.

The St. John River has risen more than three feet above its winter level and is still rising although cooler weather has made the rate of rising a little slower. There is apprehension that of the ice should move without waiting further, there will be grave damage done by the run. Not for years has the ice been so heavy. Conditions appear to be quite similar to those of 1913 when on April 1st heavy ice ran against the highway bridge and carried out the draw-span.

Water in Wilmot Park.

The sudden break-up in the weather has caused much inconvenience to some citizens, particularly to those residing in the vicinity of Wilmot Park. The trouble there seems to have been caused by the overflow of the old pond at the back of the park.

In past years the water has lain there until well into the summer when it has either soaked into the ground or evaporated. This year, however, the water is coming faster than usual and the ground is frozen deeper. The result is that the water has filled this natural depression and overflowed, a good-sized stream running all day yesterday down the back of the park, that is along the side nearest to the Trotting Park. All along Odell Avenue the inhabitants have had the greatest difficulty in getting to and from their dwellings, and in some cases it has been necessary to migrate to the upper stories. Most of the cellars have been flooded and much damage done. Last night the water froze a little but the heat of the sun is again starting it today. This morning a crew of men was put to work at opening up the drains and sewers and it is hoped that this action will cause the flood to abate somewhat and allow the people of that part of the town to return to their ordinary habits of living. Needless to say, the younger members of the flooded area are enjoying the present state of affairs to the highest.

Water in C. P. R. Yards.

Much water has also collected in the C. P. R. yards in the vicinity of the Minto Coal Company's sheds, but as far as known has done no damage.

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
