Wilfrid Lilly of Marysville, aged eighteen years, was sentenced to one year in jail by Police Magistrate Limerick this morning for the theft of breeches and puttees from the stores of No. 3 Battery, 7th Canadian Machine Gun Brigade at the Armory here The boy acknowledged the offense.

Not the First

This is not the first occasion on which Lilly has served a jail sentence as he was given three months in Bor deaux jail at Montreal about two years ago for complicity in the theft of grain from freight cars in railway yards there, three other lads being concerned. His jail record there was ascertained by means of finger prints kept at Ottawa.

Was Born at Sea

Young Lilly has been a resident of Marysville for about a year his parents having removed from Montreal to obtain employment in the cotton mill there. He was born at sea while his mother was on the way to join her husband in Montreal and thus is classed by British law as a native of Stepney, London.
