

LEAP YEAR GIVES BOOST TO WEDDINGS

Chicago, April 28—The number of marriage licenses taken out all over the United States in the first three months of leap year shows a large increase over that of last year. But there is a shortage in the supply of wedding rings reported and jewellers point out that it may be well for the women not to overplay their hand by wooing too fast. The scarcity of gold and the big demand for plain gold bands are given as the cause of the ring famine.

Another development in the jewelry trade in a year when women enjoy the traditional privilege of making their own marriage proposals is that the demand for engagement rings has shown a decided falling off. RESOURCE MAP OF CANADA

A "Map of the Dominion of Canada indicating Natural Resources, Transportation and Trade Routes", scale 100 miles to the inch has just been published by the Department of the Interior.

On this Map varieties of mineral, agricultural and fishery resources, and the timber and fur in general are printed in red lettering in their proper locations. The sites of important water powers, developed and undeveloped are indicated, and the lines of all railroads completed up to date are clearly defined.

The resources shown on the map extend from "whales" near Herschel island in the Arctic to "salt" at the southern toe of the Ontario peninsula and from the "white whales" of Ungava bay to the fruit lands near Victoria, B. C. An important inset contains 5 circular diagrams, showing the comparative contributions of each province to field crops, commercial timber, developed water power fisheries and minerals. A sixth diagram displays the proportion of the total exports filled in 1918 by manufacturers and by the five great classes of Natural Resources severally.

The thorough reliability of this map is shown by the caution which ignores probabilities however promising. The trader, investor, manufacturer and economic student will read the map as an open book; its appearance is timely when demand is abnormal and enlarged production a necessity.

The map can be obtained free of cost on application to the superintendent, Natural Resources Intelligence Branch, Department of the Interior, Ottawa.

DANDELIONS SOUGHT FOR

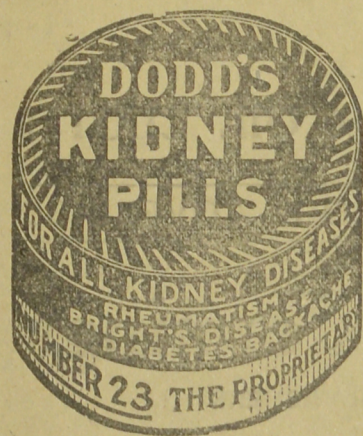

GET RID OF LICE IN THE POULTRY HOUSE

Whitewash the interior of the building at least once, if not twice each year, after having first swept the walls clean of all dust, straw, etc.

Whitewash the nests at the same time the building is whitewashed; clean them thoroughly. Clean out the nests at least once each month and put in hay or straw in them.

Spray or paint on a little liquid lice killer wherever you find any lice or mites in the nests.

Put liquid lice killer on perches every two weeks or at least once a month.

Clean off the dropping boards every morning and sprinkle some land plaster, ground lime or dry sifted earth on them.

Put a handful of air slacked lime under the ends of the roosts.

Do not allow filth to accumulate on the floor. Clean it out often.

Change the litter on the floor every two weeks or oftener, if it becomes filthy and damp.

Clean out around the water fountain and feed hoppers often. Scald the fountains and clean paint the hoppers. Wash the windows so that there will be plenty of light.

Have no dark inaccessible corners. Keep everything moving around.

Provide a dust bath of sifted earth, or if the sifted earth is not available try sifted coal ashes. Don't use road dust or wood ashes.

Clean up all rubbish which harbors rats and mice. They stir up filth which favors lice.

Have all fixture, roosts, nests, hoppers, etc., movable so they can be taken out and cleaned.

Burn sulphur or sulphur candles, if the house is badly infected.

Keep the yards and runs clean.

Allow no filth to accumulate around the fence corners or around the poultry house doors.

Feed all parings apples, roots, in pans or troughs and remove them after the fowls have eaten. Thus preventing filth from decaying vegetable matter left over.

Dust the hen with insect powder if in American Poultry Advocate.
