PLAN TO BE PRESENT

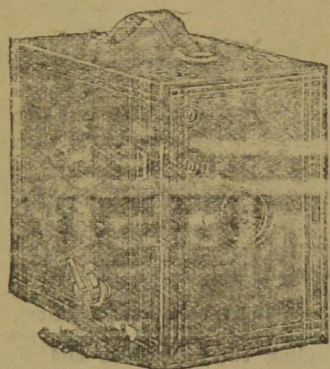
