ALDERMEN NOT PLEASED WITH BATHING BEACH OR PARK

Special Committee Will Make an Investigation of the Bathing Beach—Dressing Houses Reported to be Filthy—Grant to I. O. D. E.—Railway Improvements Discussed—Winding Up of Housing Commission Business.

The City Council met Friday night in special session made necessary by the failure to obtain a quorum at the regular meeting. The council transacted a variety of business including the appointment of a special committee to investigate conditions at the West End bathing beach where the dressing houses have been permitted to get in a most unsanitary condition. A grant was voted the I. O. D. E. in consideration of services rendered at the luncheon to the Imperial Press Party. Business done in committee was confirmed. A petition to exempt Farraline Home for the Aged from taxation, was referred to the Assessment Appeals Committee. The bills of the Housing Commission were ordered paid in connection with winding up that body. The matter of increasing the Assessors' salaries did not come up.

C. N. R. Improvements

The report of the special committee on changes and improvements suggested by the C. N. R. in connection with the intended new bridge here was adopted. The recommendations of the committee are as outlined previously. Features not before mentioned are that the C. N. R. must have the wiring and fixtures in the various subways ready for turning on current, that the proposed diversion of University Avenue be of the full street width of sixty six feet, paved with macadam with concrete curb, gutter and sidewalks. Provision for the drainage of the subways when the water in river is higher than their level also is suggested. For the extension of Union Street concrete sidewalks with concrete curb and gutter are suggested. Adherence to the original plan of taking a few feet off the eastern end of the Cathedral grounds to make an easy connection between Brunswick Street and Waterloo Row is urged. These recommendations will be forwarded to the C. N. R. authorities.

Doak School House

Ald. Young stated that the special committee on the Doak School House had not met but he had personally looked over the building. With an expenditure of a few hundred dollars the building could be put in proper condition. The trouble was that there was a dispute between factions in that part of the city one party wanting the site more convenient to the Wilsey Road. Inspector R. D. Hanson had selected a site about three quarters of a mile from the present site.

A petition of The New Brunswick Branch of the International Order of the King's Daughters and Sons for exemption from assessment on the Farraline Home for the Aged Queen Street was received. The solicitor C. D. Richards so notifying the City Council.

Ald. Wilkinson said he doubted the power of the City Council to exempt from taxation in such a case.

The matter has been referred to the Assessment Appeals Committee and the City Solicitor.

The accounts of the Fredericton Housing Commission amounting to \$580.56 for expenses incurred while the Commission was making investigation were presented to the City Council. Payment was ordered.

Ald. Wilkinson said this should warn future councils not to bow to agitation and appoint commissions without first thoroughly investigating conditions.

Grant to I. O. D. E.

In connection with the expenses attending the reception to the Imperial Press Party it was decided to present a letter of thanks to the ladies of the I. O. D. E. who arranged the luncheon for the visitors and also give a grant of one hundred dollars to them.

West End Bathing Beach

Speaking on the matter of a grant for the West End Bathing Beach His Worship said that the City Engineer had inspected the beach and had found it in very bad condition and most untidy. It looked as if the beach should either be abandoned or provision made for proper supervision.

Ald. Young said the dressing houses should be either cleansed or burned.

Ald. Baxter defended the beach. If kept clean it would be an ideal place. The dressing houses were too far from the water. Many patronized the place and it would be a shame to close it.

On the motion of Ald. Camp it was decided to appoint a committee of three to investigate and report.

Ald. Jennings said he did not want the beach closed. The bathing place should be farther up river. Floats might be provided for the dressing rooms.

Mayor Reid said the only way to run the beach was to have an overseer with powers of a constable.

Ald. Jennings, Ald. Camp and Ald. Barker were appointed on the committee.

Captured German Guns

Ald. Young asked what had been done with regard to placing the captured German guns.

Mayor Reid replied that the Federal Public Works Department had been communicated with in regard to possible sites for the guns, but no reply had been heard.

Wilmot Park Matters

Ald. Camp brought up the matter of the grant to Wilmot Park. Orders had been issued to the caretakers and never had been carried out. There were dangerous trees along Odell Avenue which had been ordered removed which still were standing. It did not look as if the city were getting much for its money.

On the motion of Ald. Wilkinson seconded by Ald. Camp it was decided to call the attention of the Park Board to this matter.

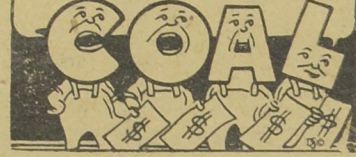
