"In citing as premeditated violations of international treaties as well as a systematical disregard of the most sacred rules of the rights of a man for some acts committed during the war by German authority, the Powers place the responsibility, at east morally, upon the former German emperor.

"They express the opinion that Holfand would not fulfil ther international duty if she refused to associate herelf with them within the limit of her ability to pursue or at least not to impede the punishment of crimes com

"They emphasize the special charac ter of their demands which contemplate not a judicial accusation but an act of high international policy and they make an appeal to Holland's respect of law and love of justice, not to cover with her moral authority violations by Germany of the essential principles of the solidarity of nations.
