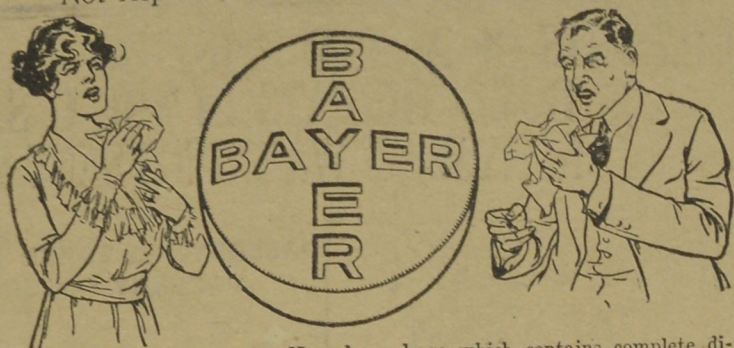

SMALL CHANGES IN PRICE OF BEEF, PORK AND FLOUR

No Signs of a Quick Drop in the Near Future—Canadian Millers Claim That Conditions are Unfavorable to Them—The British Government Refuses to Give Relief to the Bacon Trade in That Country.

We have been reminded on several occasions of late what an important—not to say vital—part is played in the welfare of the country by our export trade. Its falling off always affects the prosperity of the traders; but in one instance at least a decline in exports bids fair to curtail the supply of the war Canada built up a big trade in bacon with the United Kingdom. Prices of hogs rose rapidly and farmers went in heavily for breeding them. A measure of the extent of this development is given by the export returns of the Department of Trade and Commerce. In the fiscal year which ended in March, 1914, our exports of bacon were only thirty-six million pounds in weight; while in the year from March, 1919, to March, 1920, they weighed two hundred and twenty-three million pounds.

Now, as was the case as regards a number of other commodities, the selling of bacon was controlled in England during the war. The situation at present is somewhat peculiar. Trade in imported bacon is still controlled and the price at which it may be sold is fixed. But the price of British or Irish bacon is not controlled.

The price fixed for imported bacon has been so low for a long time now that it has not paid the Canadian farmer to raise hogs. The Canadian packers have tried to get the British Government to give relief from this handicap to the Canadian bacon trade, but so far in vain. The packers asked first for the removal of control on Canadian as on English and Irish bacon; but when that was refused they suggested that a higher price be fixed for Canadian than for American bacon. They were quite confident that they could sell their product at the higher price in competition with the American article. But this request was also refused and there was consequently a big slump in the hog market in Canada.

Going Up Again

This slump took place in the latter part of 1919 and at the opening of 1920, and the movement latterly has been on the whole upwards.

Another Canadian product to which the export trade is of high import at the present time is beef. In the last fiscal year before the war we exported thirteen million pounds of beef; in the year ending with this last March our exports of this article of food were one hundred and ten million pounds. During the current fiscal year exports of beef have fallen off badly, for the first two months being only nine and a half million pounds, approximately. The result has been a slight falling off in price the January price for good steers at Montreal being \$14.25 a hundred and that for August 5 being \$13.50. The price of beef this fall, packers state, will depend on the development of the export business. If a market is available abroad, the price will remain firm; otherwise there is likely to be a considerable fall.

Two Points of View

Of course, a movement downwards in price of foods is regarded in distinctly different ways by the producer and by the consumer. A reduction in the cost of living is regarded by students of the situation as well as by the harassed householder as a thing to be desired; but a sudden slump owing to the closing of an outside market is likely to result in the loss of food.

values by the premature slaughter of cattle before they have reached their best condition. A reduction in the production of beef is not however, possible in the short time in which it has been accomplished in the matter of

hogs. Beef takes about three years to grow; while hogs mature twice a year.

A third Canadian product, the export market for which is in the balance, is flour. Ocean freights on wheat now give such an advantage to the shipment of wheat over flour that Canadian millers find it extremely difficult to compete in the British market with the British miller. The present differential on wheat, it is stated, gives the British miller an advantage of over forty cents a barrel, when ten cents is a good margin. A deputiation of millers recently waited upon the Federal Government to ask for assistance in securing relief from this handicap. The Government does not control ocean rates, but it was suggested that the Canadian Government Merchant Marine should be used to bring competition to play by the reductions of rates on flour on the Government owned ships.

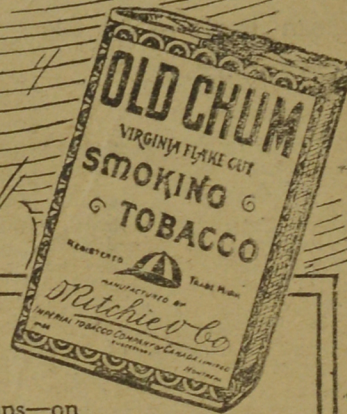
