STRONG TICKET IN FIELD IN CHARLOTTE COUNTY

Government Supporters Held a Rousing Convention at Saint Stephen Yesterday — John W. Scovil, Harry W. Mann, Mayor Frank Kennedy and Hugh R. Lawrence Chosen — Good Prospects of Success.

St. Stephen, Sept. 22—Four strong and popular men were chosen as the government standard-bearers at the convention here today. They are John W. Scovil of St. Stephen, Harry W. Mann of St. Stephen, Frank Kennedy of St. Andrews and Hugh R. Lawrence of St. George. There was a large attendance at the convention from every part of Charlotte County. The outlook for a government victory in this constituency is very bright, due to the impression made on the public by the progressive administration of the Foster government. There is a strong feeling among many of those in Charlotte county who have not previously been supporters of Hon. Mr. Foster's party that the government of which he is the head should be continued in office and enabled to carry out the policies which are doing so much to advance the interests of the people.

The convention today was held in the Gaiety Hall Geo. M. Byron, of St. Andrews, was chosen as chairman, and expressed the pleasure it gave him to preside over such a large delegation. He knew that the candidates elected this afternoon would receive more support than had ever been given here before because of the good work that had been done by the Foster government. He especially spoke of the good roads and defied anyone to deny the fact that never had the roads of New Brunswick been in such good shape as they are at the present time. Mr. Byron also spoke of the great benefit that had been derived from the health act.

Secretary P. E. Laughlin was then called upon to read the minutes of the last meeting, which were approved.

A nominating committee, consisting of David Mann, St. Stephen; Brooks Winchester, Grand Manan; Will Holt, St. Andrews, and Walter Lynott, of St. George, were chosen to select four candidates for the coming election. These men, who were representatives of the different parts of the county, brought before the meeting the names of John W. Scovil, St. Stephen; Harry W. Mann, St. Stephen; Frank Kennedy, St. Andrews, and H. R. Lawrence, St. George, who were unanimously endorsed and cheered. The chairman then called on the different candidates.

Mr. Lawrence.

H. R. Lawrence was the first to speak, referring to the great work that had been done by the Foster government since they had been in power. He spoke especially of the road policy that had been adopted by this government, and he said that if returned they would keep up the good work. He also spoke of the labor legislation which had been put through by the present government so that now the labor men were protected in case of accident. (Cheers.)

Mr. Lawrence thanked the convention for the honor they had bestowed on him by selecting him as one of their candidates in the coming election and promised that if elected would do all in his power to look after the people of Charlotte county and the province of New Brunswick. On resuming his seat Mr. Lawrence was heartily applauded.

Mr. Scovil.

Mr. Scovil who is a new man in the field but well known to every one as a hard and energetic worker in anything he attempts was next called on. He was loudly cheered. His opening remarks were: "We are going to win." He said that his whole interest was in Charlotte county and the province of New Brunswick.

He spoke of Charlotte as a county with great material resources, such as mines water-power and two of the finest natural harbors. (Cheers.) All these needed was development, which he could assure the people of Charlotte that if elected he would work for their best interest. He spoke of the Foster government as the best and most progressive government that this province had known, and said that if brought back into power, which he had no doubt would be the case they would continue their good work. Mr. Scovil also spoke of the good roads and of the stumpage which the present government had increased from \$1.50 to five dollars, thereby greatly increasing the revenue of the province. Before taking his seat he thanked the convention for their faith in him and said that if elected he would do everything in his power to work for the benefit of Charlotte county. (Cheers.)

Frank Kennedy.

Frank Kennedy mayor of St. Andrews, another new candidate in the

field, and who is also widely known and very popular, then briefly expressed his pleasure at being so honored. He spoke of the good roads and other good policies of the Foster government and promised that if elected, he would do his utmost to look after the interest of the county of Charlotte. (Applause.)

H. M. Mann.

Harry W. Mann, the fourth member of the government ticket was called on and in a very forcible speech expressed the pleasure it gave him to again be a candidate on the government ticket. He felt that in other years they had had an uphill fight but now that with the good work that had been done by the present government the electors of Charlotte would show their appreciation and faith to the government and that Charlotte would no longer be in opposition.

The Road Work.

B. M. Hill, chief road engineer, was the next speaker and briefly outlined the work that had been done on the roads and of the system that the province was carrying out in order to have good trunk roads from Maine to Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island via St. Andrews, St. George St. John and Moncton; from St. John to St. Jacques via Fredericton, Woodstock and Edmundston; from Cape Tormentine to Quebec via Shediac, Moncton, Richibucto, Chatham; from St. Stephen to Fredericton and up the North Shore. He also spoke of the work that had been done on other roads and of the work yet to be done.

Mr. Hill said that now the most expensive part of the work was already finished, and from now on the work could be continued much cheaper.

Other speakers were Louis Connors of Blacks Harbor, Brooks Winchester of Grand Manan and Dr. Dyas of St. Stephen, and each one expressed himself very enthusiastically in favor of the candidates that had been so well selected, and of the support which they felt the ticket would receive.

At the close of the meeting three hearty cheers were given the candidates and everyone went away well satisfied that never before in this county was there a stronger ticket of straight, upright, energetic men than the government party has here now.
