FLAG SHOULD NOT BE USED TO COVER SHADY PLACES

Sir:—With the near approach and the necessity in the near future for an election for members of the Dominion Parliament at Ottawa, would it not be an extreme benefit, or in order, to place on the statute books of our Dominion a law that would be by all means fair and just, defining how the Canadian flag, or the Union Jack should be used—whether as an emblem of respect and of decency or one of trickery to cover the shady spots? Great Britain has laws defining how the flag shall be used, both honestly and decently, and the English people have a good wholesome regard and worthy respect for their flag, that has waved on sea and shore for one thousand years or more, since the days in the distant past when good King Alfred fought the Danes. For a house or a street parade, or decoration or for some auspicious or historic occasion it is not at all amiss to decorate or commemorate an anniversary or such like. The United States have strict laws that make it a very serious offence to flout their emblem, the Stars and Stripes, in the dust or use the flag for advertising purposes or shady transactions. Only in Canada are the "better than thou" patriots allowed to display our flag in whatever way that suits them, making some lofty grandstand display, waving the flag to enthrone and cover up the defects that are sadly out of date, and moreover out of tune.

Who in the past has not heard or seen about the arrival of the Hon. Josiah Soakum or the Hon. Jeremiah Bunkum from Skedunk to help out the party over the rough spots and to enthrone the faithful where they hold forth at one of the most fashionable hotels, during daylight hours, where a reception is held? When the evening shadows fall and the sun is sinking in the west, a brass band arrives on the scene and plays some old familiar tunes, such as Scots who hae with Wallace bled; last not least, St. Patrick's Day in the Morning, with variations being a first class musical combination, who know no politics, who play for the coin that 's in it. They kindly serenade the Hons. Bunkum

and Soakum with choice music for some twenty minutes to enthrone the throng. They are then escorted to the Opera House, or Hall, where patriotic music, such as the Maple Leaf Forever, Rule Britannia, Britons Never Shall Be Slaves, is rendered. The audience having been provided with small flags of the Union Jack or Canadian variety, at the psychological moment when the Hon. St. and the Hon. Jeremiah have rehased on the old party and polished over the rough spots, the faithful on the platform having been given the cue, the audience rises to their feet, the grandstand display is then performed, waving the flag for the occasion. The band plays patriotic airs—Rule Britannia, O Canada, The Maple Leaf Forever.

That kind of cheap-me-down performances may be good politics. It is in fact too shallow by far. No sensible person, Canadian or otherwise, who lives handy the salt water, no matter what their politics may be, could not but be disappointed at such small tactics. When the Shedunk performers come again, give us something more progressive than in the past. Too many lads have been in France and Belgium of late years, on the fields where poppies grow, and many have travelled far outside our Provinces down by the sea. Use the flag to better advantage as an emblem of respect. Cut out the Bunkum game.

BANK DIRECTOR WAS SLAIN BY ROBBERS

Bank Hold-up Pulled Off in Real Jesse James Style—Robbers Masked and Heavily Armed.

Baltimore, April 27—Seven armed bandits this afternoon entered the First National Bank of Sanly Springs, Montgomery county, Maryland, shot and killed one of the directors, locked the clerks and officials in a vault and made off in a big touring car with \$45,000. In their haste the robbers, who wore masks and carried rifles and revolvers, overlooked several thousand dollars. Believing the outlaws may be hiding in the woods, armed posses are searching Howard county.

It was because of his deafness that Francis M. Hallowell, one of the directors of the bank, lost his life. At the time of the entry of the robbers his back was toward the door and he did not hear their command "hands up." One of the outlaws interpreted defiance or an attempt at a subterfuge and killed him.

The outlaws worked with amazing quickness, and intimidating the clerks and officials, backed them into the vault and swung the heavy door shut. While the employees and officials were being corralled by two of the bandits three others gathered up currency and packed it into money bags which they threw to two sentries who remained in the automobile.

There were few persons in the bank when the robbery occurred. It was near 3 o'clock the closing hour, when Frank Miller, a clerk, who was on his way to bolt the front door of the bank saw a big car stop. He saw that it contained seven men, all of them big and rough looking. Three stepped out of the tonneau and were followed by two others who occupied the front seat. Reaching the entrance of the bank, the five men brushed Miller aside and strode into the room. The last man turned suddenly and covered him while the others drew automatic revolvers and covered the cashier, Frederick Thomas, who was at one of the windows.

"Stand still!" one of the men snapped out. "And hands up, all of you. We'll shoot, and shoot damn quick if you don't put 'em up. Now quick."

Hallowell, because of his affliction did not turn until one of the automatons was fired, and then whirled, as he fell to the floor, mortally wounded. The bullet entered his back and penetrated the heart.

Two of the men were counted off to care for the officials and clerks, while the others emptied the cash drawers. When the door of the vault had been locked on the prisoners one of the outlaws whistled and the bandits sped away.

CANADIAN RULES TAKEN

Antwerp, April 29—The International Hockey Congress unanimously adopted the Canadian playing rules at the annual meeting. United States and Czechoslovaks were admitted, while the Oxford-Canadian membership was changed to the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association. The European and world's championship will be held at Stockholm, and Sweden has tendered an invitation to the Canadian champions. All enemy countries are barred from membership until accepted by the International Olympic committee. The officers elected were: President Sillig, of Switzerland; Vice-President Loicq, of Belgium, and Vice-President Hewitt of Canada. The Canadians will visit to Belgian battlefields for the balance of the week, and sail from Havre on May 5.

EGG PRICES IN ONTARIO

Toronto, April 26—During the week past there has been a steady upward trend in the egg market, and prices at country points have advanced from a range of 44 to 45 cents up to a range of 46 to 48. Prices to the retail trade have advanced in sympathy, quotations at the beginning of the week being 50c to 52c, while yesterday's range was 52c to 53c.

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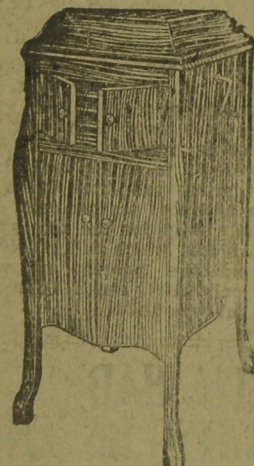
