MEMBER OF PARLIAMENT THREATENED WITH SUIT

F. S. Cahill, M. P. for Pontiac, Referred to Speech Made Before the Montreal Reform Club—D. B. Hanna, of Canadian National Railways, Threatens Legal Action as a Result of Statements Concerning Himself.

Ottawa, May 14—While the house of commons was sitting in committee on the agriculture estimates this morning, Hon. J. D. Reid, moved the adjournment so as to permit F. S. Cahill (Pontiac), an opportunity to make a statement with regard to the Department of Railways and Canals. The statement had reference to a threatened suit for damages made by D. B. Hanna, president of the Canadian National Railways, against Mr. Cahill over recent utterances of the latter before the Montreal Reform Club. A non-contentious item in the railways and canals estimates was taken up to permit of the statement being made.

Mr. Cahill drew the attention of the house to a news despatch which appeared on April 27, and which said that D. B. Hanna was suing him (Mr. Cahill) because of some statements alleged to have been made at the Montreal Reform Club. In the item Mr. Hanna was quoted as saying that the whole thing was a political game, and that he had never thought of buying a lot in the west.

Mr. Cahill remarked in opening that he had received no notice as yet of the writ in this case having been issued.

"I am not at all afraid of it," he said. He then quoted from Poor's Annual to the effect that the Canadian Northern town properties company owned sites for about three hundred towns and villages. He had made a special trip to the department of the secretary of state to find who were the directors of this company and discovered that D. B. Hanna was the president.

This company, went on Mr. Cahill, was not the property of the Canadian people.

He had never said Mr. Hanna had bought any lots in the west, but he had said Mr. Hanna was interested in a company which sold lots there. In looking over Poor's Annual, he found that the Canadian government did not take over the Inverness Railway and Coal Company when taking over the Canadian Northern.

The corporate officers of this railway and coal company were Sir William Mackenzie, Sir Donald Mann, R. A. MacLeod and others.

"It is quite apparent from that," said Mr. Cahill, "that the company of which Mr. Hanna is president is buying coal from the company of which Sir William Mackenzie is president. It is also quite apparent that the Canadian National Railway Company, of which Mr. Hanna is president, is in a position to bring business to the towns which may be benefitted which

are the property of the Canadian Northern town properties company."

Hon. Dr. Reid, minister of railways said that so far as any legal proceedings between Mr. Hanna and Mr. Cahill were concerned, the government had no interest. It was a personal matter to be settled between the two. But if the suit was to go on, it probably was well to clear up the charges which Mr. Cahill had made. As regards the Inverness Coal Company, the prices at which the contract with that company was made were fixed by the Fuel Controller of Canada based on the cost of production in the mines. The International Railway had been buying coal from them for many years.

It was delivered at Point Tupper, which was sixty miles from the Intercolonial line and the government paid \$1 or \$1.25 per ton extra for the haul of the coal. If they bought elsewhere and hauled it to the place where it was needed it would cost just as much. Dr. Reid continued that he was only aiming to show that the prices were fixed by the Fuel Controller. Neither Mr. Hanna nor Sir William Mackenzie had anything to do with them. As a matter of fact the Inverness Coal Company had not been in the hands of Mackenzie and Mann for six years. During that time the mines had been in the control of a liquidator.

Dr. Reid said that when his estimates came down he would be prepared to give exhaustive information on all transaction of the government railways and its officers. He has Mr. Hanna's assurance that the general manager did not own land in the west nor had he an interest in townships. He must accept Mr. Hanna's word until some proof could be brought that it was incorrect.

The matter was then dropped, and the item under discussion carried.

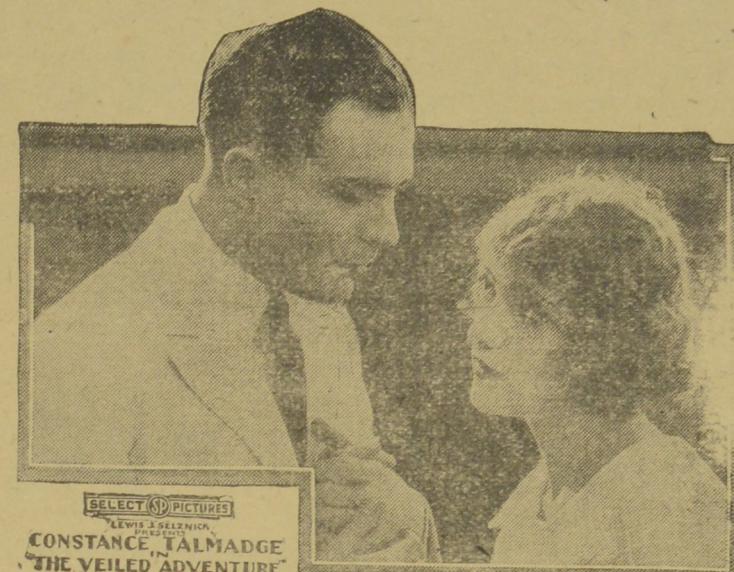
