SHORTENING THE ALPHABET.

A letter from Japan to New York includes mention of a shortening of the Japanese alphabet as a means of making children's schooling an easier task, at present in course of adoption by government decree. Heretofore, according to this information, Japanese children had to learn 5,000 alpha betical characters before they were able to read and write. This number has now been decreased by law to 2,600.
