FARMERS FROM ILLINOIS ARE COMING TO CANADA

An Attractive Picture of Conditions in the West Has Been Painted for Their Benefit by Canadian Agents—A Special Train Loaded With Settlers to Start for Brandon, Man.—Boosting of Rents Causing Them to Leave.

Bloomington, Ill., March 4—Painting an alluring picture of the agricultural prospects of Manitoba, agents of the Canadian Government have been at work among tenant-farmers of Central Illinois during the last week, and have persuaded a large number of them that the land all but flows with milk and honey.

Attractive figures for rent and rosette assurances of huge yields have had their effect and a special train will start from this section on Wednesday, with Brandon, Man., as the objective point. From that city the prospectors will scatter to various points in the Province. The special will be made up of 42 cars of household goods, implements for farming and live stock.

Assembling Points

The following places are the assembling points, Lexington, two cars; Chenoa, one car; Chatsworth, fourteen; Cayuga, one; Pontiac, five; Odell, four; Dwight, nine, Wilmington, four, and Lockport, two.

It is said that there are 25 families represented. All will proceed by coach trains enough to take care of the live stock on the special.

Inquiry as to the cause for this exodus develops that the high price of Central Illinois farms is largely responsible. Values have assumed a staggering proportion since the war. Ordinary farms that were regarded

as worth \$200 to \$250 an acre before the war now are being sold all the way from \$300 to \$400 an acre, while tracts with extra choice improvements are bringing \$500 to \$600.

Higher Rentals

Owners of this land with sudden inflated value area are naturally asking higher rental. Some of the tenants are remaining while many others are seeking new locations in Iowa and the other States of the Northwest, while a number are selecting Canada.

The special to move March 3 is being financed by the Canadian Government, according to reports. Agents of that Government have made all arrangements for the transportation.

The train will be handled over the Chicago & Alton to Chicago and thence over the Soo Line to Manitoba. Officials of the C. & A. agree that the call for immigrant cars has been greater this year than in many preceding years, stating that there is to be a very great exodus from Illinois.

Vacated Farms to be Taken

Central Illinois landowners are agreed that the vacated farms will be all snapped up by other tenants and that the departure will have no serious effects. They maintain that the higher prices received for live stock and all other farm products will equal the higher rental, and that tenants will find their profits fully as great this year as in the past.

They further aver that the well-known record of Central Illinois for scarcity of crop failures is being overlooked by those who are emigrating. They believe that most of the wanderers will return.

When Mr. Small went out of the world of Toronto he disappeared completely and left not a single trace behind that could be called a clue. The police authorities have worked diligently and long in trying to locate the whereabouts and try to clear up the mystery of his sudden exit from his usual surrounding. The detectives who had the case in hand have followed every clue no matter how minute but all their efforts to locate the missing man have missed fire.
