

## SAWMILL TO BE LOCATED AT SPRINGHILL

**STANLEY SCOTT BUYS  
OLD MURRAY MILL SITE**

**Dwellings and Other Buildings  
Also Transferred—Mill will  
be Built and Operated  
Shortly.**

Sawmilling at Springhill, York County will be revived in the near future, Stanley Scott of this city having purchased the site near the mouth of Springhill Creek, which has been used from the earliest days of sawmilling in this section of the province. The site was occupied by the Murray mill for years. Fires destroyed several of the mills on that site the latest being that of the Scott Lumber Company, which operated a mill there after the Murray mill was destroyed. Fraser Companies Limited at the time it purchased the properties of the Scott Lumber Company, acquired the site and a number of dwellings and other buildings there. John F. Doherty, owner of the Springhill Hotel bought the property some years ago from Fraser Companies Limited and Mr. Scott has purchased from him.

Mr. Scott intends to build early in the spring and will operate his mill this season. The mill will be about the same size as those which occupied the site previously.

The new owner of the property tried to locate nearer Fredericton but was unable to secure a suitable site.

## DEVON SCHOOL CLOSED BY LACK OF FUEL TODAY

**FUEL SCARCITY STILL  
A SERIOUS PROBLEM**

**Furniture and Buildings Burn-  
ed in Some Cases—Roads  
Not Yet Broken—Con-  
ditions Unique.**

The scarcity of fuel in Fredericton and vicinity still is causing great inconvenience. This morning the public school of the town of Devon consisting of eight departments, was closed on account of absolute lack of wood to heat the building. The Devon School Board expected wood to arrive in time to prevent the closing of the school but the condition of the highways from snow caused delay.

The school was reopened this afternoon.

**Burning Furniture and Buildings**  
Conditions are similar in all sections. There have been frequent instances in Fredericton of people breaking up furniture, some old and some comparatively new, to keep fires going during the cold weather. Sheds and outbuildings also have been pulled down to supply fuel for short periods until wood could be obtained.

The country roads are being broken out slowly and wood is arriving very slowly with prices high. The situation is further aggravated by low coal supplies and freight congestion on the railways.

**Condition Never Surpassed**  
Men well over eighty years of age state that in their recollection highways never were so blocked by snow as they are at present.

### Big Cut of Pulpwood

It is understood that plans are being made for a record breaking cut of pulpwood on Poklok waters during the coming season. It is estimated that the total will be at least three hundred thousand cords. It will be cut in the spring, floated down the stream and after being peeled and sawn into lengths will be loaded on cars for shipment to the United States. The lumberlands on the Poklok are owned by a Maine concern and the cut of pulpwood will be made by Americans. It is said that a stumpage rate of three dollars per thousand has been agreed upon. This promises to be the biggest pulp operation in the County of York next season.
