250th ANNIVERSARY OF THE HUDSON BAY COMPANY

Great Celebration Now Going on in Western Canada—Sir Robert Kindersley, President of the Company, Has Made a Special Trip to Canada to Attend the Function—Many Interesting Historical Spectacles—Indians Will Take Part in the Festivities.

Winnipeg Man. April 30—The stage is set for the celebration throughout western Canada of the 250th anniversary of the Hudson's Bay Company. The celebration will centre in Winnipeg, Edmonton, Calgary, Vancouver and Victoria. It will open in Winnipeg May 3 and close in Victoria on Empire day, May 24. In Winnipeg, it will be held from May 3 to 5; in Edmonton from May 6 to 8; in Calgary from May 11 to 13; in Vancouver from May 15 to 19; and in Victoria from May 21 to 24.

Sir Robert Kindersley, governor of the Hudson's Bay Company, a director of the Bank of England, and regarded as one of Great Britain's most distinguished financiers, has made a special trip to Canada to attend the celebration.

As the history of the Hudson's Bay Company was for two centuries the history of Western Canada, the celebration will take on the character of a national event. It is expected that the cities in which the celebration will be held will declare holidays and Dominion, provincial and city officials and civic, patriotic and religious societies will take part in the commemoration.

Mr. Louis E. Wilson of London, famous in England as a manager of public events, was sent to Canada by the Hudson's Bay Company to plan and superintend the celebration. Mr. Wilson has been in the West for several months in connection with the elaborate pageants that will be held in the five cities.

Historical Spectacle.

The river pageant at Winnipeg under the direction of Mr. Godsell of the Company's Fur Trade Department will be one of the most interesting historical spectacles ever staged in Canada. Starting from a point above the site of Old Fort Garry at the junction of the Red and Assiniboine rivers, it will pass down the latter stream through the city and through a countryside intimately associated with the Hudson's Bay Company's early history. Fort Garry from which Winnipeg evolved was for years the capital of the company's vast empire. A few miles below the city is the site of Old Fort Douglas. Nearby is the battlefield of Seven Oaks where Governor Semple and twenty men fell in conflict with their rivals of the Northwest Company. All along the river banks once stood the homes of Lord Selkirk's Red river settlers. The journey will end eighteen miles below Winnipeg at Lower Fort Garry whose ancient stone buildings enclosed by a high stone wall with embrasures and watch towers still preserve the atmosphere and picturesqueness of the frontier past.

Indians Taking Part.

Indians of a dozen tribes, whose ancestors were bound to the old company by ties of friendship and unswerving loyalty and who are today proud to be known as "Hudson's Bay Com-

pany Indians" will take part in the pageant. Crees from the shores of Hudson Bay, Swampy Crees from James' Bay, Plain Crees from northern Saskatchewan, Ojibways from the Company's posts in the region north of Lake Superior, Blackfoot, Piegan and Assiniboines from the prairies, carrier Indians from British Columbia and tribesmen from the Athabasca country will all be represented.

An Indian fur brigade in York boats and canoes will lead the pageant.

Governor Sir Robert Kindersley in a "North canoe" will follow with his entourage. Then will come canoes and freight boats piled high with bales of fur and manned by factors and trappers in the costumes of by-gone centuries. British Columbia Indians will bring up the rear. The long procession as it winds down the historic Red river will seem to have sailed out of the past of 250 years ago.

To Fire a Salute.

When the pageant reaches Lower Fort Garry, two ancient brass cannon at the gate will thunder a salute. The first treaty between western Indians and the Canadian Indian Commission was signed in Lower Fort Garry in 1871, and at an open-air ceremony within the walls, Governor Kindersley will seal anew the ancient friendship between the Redmen and the Hudson's Bay Company. Passing in line, the Indians will be introduced individually to the governor and shake his hand and to each one Sir Robert will present a medal struck in commemoration of the Company's anniversary. Then Indians and governor will smoke the calumet of peace in token of future friendship. The peace pipe specially made for the occasion will bear carved upon its stem the totems of all the tribes taking part in the celebration and will be presented to Governor Kindersley as a souvenir.

Belt for Governor.

At the conclusion of the ceremony, a feast will be spread during which Governor Kindersley and his associates will be seated at a table while the Indian will squat in a semicircle upon the ground. Speeches will be made by Indians orators and Governor Kindersley will reply. After the addresses, the Indians will present a wampum belt to the governor as an expression of loyalty to the Company.

In the four other cities—Edmonton, Calgary, Vancouver and Victoria—the celebration will be marked by street pageants. Symbolic floats and tableaux will portray phases of early Hudson's Bay Company activities. Indians and trappers with their ponies and dog-teams will take part in the procession with platoons of Royal North-West Mounted Police, government officials, women's and automobile clubs and civic societies. The line in each city is expected to be several miles long.

Not the least noteworthy feature of the anniversary will be the exhibition in the five cities concerned of moving picture films which will epitomize the romance of the far fur country. These pictures were taken by H. M. Wychoff, an expert moving camera man of the British Educational Films Corporation and who spent seven months from last June to January with two expeditions sent out after photographs by the Hudson's Bay Company. The first expedition was under Captain Mack in the Hudson's Bay and Labrador districts. It brought back pictures of the company's old fur posts on Hudson Bay and James' Bay and quaint and romantic life among the Eskimos on the coasts of Hudson Straits.

The second expedition was commanded by Captain Tom O'Kelly, who has seen twenty years service with the company in the Northwest. This expedition travelled through a vast extent of territory in the Athabasca and Great Slave lake region and after many hardships and adventures, returned with some remarkable moving pictures ever taken in the remote regions beyond civilization's frontiers. The pictures of wild animals in their native haunts are perhaps the best ever obtained. How the pelts are removed and dried and how the trappers live on their lonely traps lines through the long winter air all set forth in vivid detail.

Arrangements have been made by the Hudson's Bay Company to exhibit these interesting films in theaters operated in Winnipeg, Edmonton, Calgary, Vancouver and Victoria by the

Allen Theatre Enterprises of Canada, incorporation that controls leading moving picture houses throughout the Dominion. The public will be invited to be guests of the Hudson's Bay Company at performances during the pageants and celebrations in the five cities. It is planned to exhibit these pictures later in Eastern Canada, the United States and Great Britain.

A notable banquet will be that of the Old Timers' Association at Winnipeg. The members of this body have all been identified with the pioneer history and development of Western Canada and many of them have seen years of service with the Hudson's Bay Company.

The charter creating the Company of Adventurers of England Trading into Hudson's Bay was signed by King Charles II. on May 2, 1670. At the height of its power, the Company ruled three-fourths of the North American continent. It surrendered its authority and territories to Canada in 1870. With its empire gone, it has become a great modern merchant with a chain of departmental stores extending across western Canada. With its old trapping grounds usurped by farms and cities, it has gone further afield and it has more fur posts today than ever before in its history and is still the world's greatest fur company. With the opening of all its remaining lands to farm settlement, it has become in recent years, one of the great colonizing forces in Canada. With 250 years of history and romance behind it, it has the distinction of being the oldest mercantile corporation in existence.
