## GROWING OF FALL WHEAT IN NEW BRUNSWICK

At various times individual farmers in the Maritime Provinces have experimented with the sowing of Fall Wheat, and with very varying results. So far as any definite records go, there is nothing available upon the results obtained. Perhaps it is sufficient to state that the sowing of Fall Wheat has never become general, and those who did experiment have not followed up the practice. However, neither has the growing of Spring Wheat been by any means a universal practice.

With a view of getting some definite data there was sown at the Dominion Experimental Station, Fredericton, on August 30th, 1918, two bushels of Dawson's Golden Chaff on an acre of land that had been well manured the year previously for roots and grew a solid crop of peas and oats in 1918. This wheat made a stand of from 8 to 10 inches in the Autumn, and wintered exceedingly well, coming on rapidly in the Spring making a growth of from 40 to 45 inches in the summer of 1919, and ripening up sufficiently to cut on the 31st July. This crop thrashed out 34 bushels to the acre or a splendid sample of grain. There was a very favorable Winter for this crop. Though not much covering during December, from Christmas on there was a very even covering of snow and no ice nor hard crusts.

On August 28th this wheat was sown at the rate of 2-bushels per acre on land from which a crop of clover had been cut and manured at the rate of 17 tons per acre. The Autumn growth on this land did not exceed six inches, and, although there was a fairly good snow covering, the April frosty nights and sunny days seemed to have a rather bad effect, and there was not much more than a fifty per cent stand. Part of the field was so poor that it was ploughed up in June and potatoes planted. However, the balance of the field, about two-thirds of the area, amounting to approximately an acre, has come on well and on the 21st July the grains are milky, and the crop should ripen off before the 5th of August.

One of the advantages of Fall Wheat growing where wintering is successful, is that it ripens up before the fungus diseases, which attack Spring Wheat, seem to develop, and it has, therefore, suffered no damage from Glume spot nor rust, and so far as the experience at Fredericton goes, it is a better crop than Spring Wheat, which in most varieties, has been annually very injuriously affected by the Glume spot (so-called), which cuts off the supply of sap to the grains and gives a large proportion of shrunken grain.

## DIAMONDS TO ADVANCE IN PRICE

London, Sept. 3.—"The price of diamonds and of diamond rings will probably be increased fifty per cent in the next six months" said A. Mayer, of Brooklyn, a leader of the American delegation at the conference of the Universal Alliance of Diamond Workers of the World. "This is due to two things, first, that the diamond mine owners of South America intend to close their mines until the demand is greater than the supply; and second the demand formulated in the convention here for a 44 hour week for the diamond worker of the world, with a determination for an international strike if the demands are not granted."

## WILL ENFORCE DRUGS ACT

London, Sept. 3.—The London Daily Mail says today "The enforcement of the 'Dangerous Drugs' act begins tomorrow. The law is aimed to close London's mysterious midnight opium dens and prevent the drug fiends from obtaining dope. It forbids the importation of opium prepared for smoking or cocaine, heroin except as licensed medically. Violators are punished by six months in jail, or a sentence of five thousand dollars."
