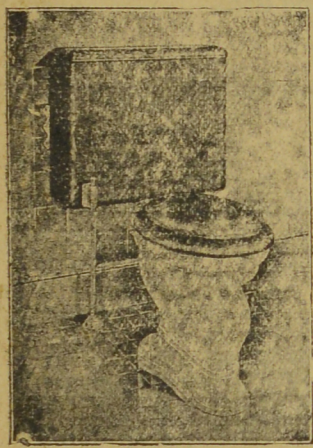

## SHARKS OFF CUBAN COAST HAD A GENUINE FEAST

Many Head of Cattle Which Died on Shipboard Were Thrown Into the Sea—A Change in the Diet for Sharks—They Hang Around the Ship Begging for More—Keep the Water Fairly Boiling With Their Movements.

Probably the sharks off the Cuban coast are still wondering whose treat it was. Probably however, they are also saying "Ishkabibble", if sharks off the Cuban coast ever talk Yiddish. Anyway it must have been a rather pleasant change from the usual shark menu of seaweed, coral shoots, lesser fish and rash black divers.

Capt. Bugge of the good ship St. Charles at Quarantine today saw the sharks, and Capt. Bugge would slay the man who suggested that he had astigmatism.

"Hundreds and hundreds on 'em," said the captain, "and, by gosh, how they did folly that ship after they got a taste of that there roast beef medium! They a'most clumb up the goshdarn sides o' the goshdarn ship, just beggin' for more beef. ## Parboiled Cow on the Menu

No sooner does we flip these 600 late cattle overboard than all the sharks inside of a hundred miles comes atearin' through the water. The water, y'see, was pretty hot, and a'most the minnit the cows hit it they wuz sort o' parboiled."

## PROOF THAT RUSSIAN CZAR AND FAMILY WERE ALL KILLED

London, Aug. 30—The former Dowager Empress of Russia, and her sister Queen Mother Alexandra of England have received reports which seem to remove all possible doubts that the Dowager Empress's son, the Czar and his family were murdered in the basement of their prison home at Ekaterinburg on the night of July 16, 1198. The reports were made by two investigators and have been printed in the London Times and the Magazine Nineteenth Century and After.

The Times report was made by Robert Wilton, formerly a correspondent at Petrograd. Capt. Francis McCullagh of the British army, formerly a widely known newspaper correspondent wrote the other story. Both went to Ekaterinburg for several weeks and interviewed civilians and soldiers who were eye witnesses.

Both investigators declare the assassination was arranged by Yurowski, who was the jailer in charge of the royal family. Capt. McCullagh declares that it was Yurowski personally who shot the Czar as the latter stepped in front of his wife and children to shield them.

## Condemned 60 to Death

Yurowski, who had been president of the Extraordinary Commission at Ekaterinburg, told Capt. McCullagh last March that he had condemned to death sixty persons suspected of anti-Bolshevik sentiments. McCullagh quotes him as saying, "What are sixty men!"

After the assassination Yurowski hurried to Moscow and reported to Lenin. McCullagh says that he received as his reward an appointment—strangely enough—as commissioner of life insurance in the Ekaterinburg province. He lives in a handsome residence, confiscated from a wealthy merchant, but is shunned by even the members of his own Bolshevik party.

There were eleven victims of the massacre, say the reports. They were the Czar, Czarina, Czarevitch, the four Princesses, a Dr. Botkin and three servants. Twelve soldiers acted as the firing squad under Yurowski's orders. They were not Russians, the Bolsheviks fearing a Russian soldier could not be trusted with the particular job on hand. The Times says they were Letts, but Capt. McCullagh says they were Magyars.

## Czar Shot Guarding Wife

Yurowski shouted the order for the execution of 'Nicholas Romanoff the Bloody and all hi' family' as the unfortunate victims crossed themselves kneeling on the floor. The Czar was shot as he stepped in front of his wife. The others were then shot with revolvers and the soldiers afterward bayoneted the bodies.

The Dowager Empress is living in seclusion at Copenhagen but had re-

fused to give up hope that her son and his family might have escaped. Like wise the Queen Mother of England hoped that her nephew might have escaped. The investigators made private reports to the Queen Mother and these confirm the other previous reports that the royal family had been massacred.

## EASY TO HOCK SILK NIGHTIE

"That Kansas City girl who tried to pawn her \$23 night dress and couldn't raise a loan on it should come to this city. She could hock her nightie in a minute here—or her dress, shoes stock ings, even her corsets," said a Ninth avenue pawnbroker, discussing a recent Western dispatch.

"Of course, you couldn't hock any kind of dress goods in some Manhattan pawnshops, which take only precious stones or jewelry."

"But it's different in many shops especially those on the lower East Side. Why, I remember when I was clerking down there, before I started in up here for myself, that women and girls would come into the store and pawn pretty nearly every kind of a garment they wear."

"I'll bet I've written pawntickets for a hundred pairs of corsets if I've written one. The same with corset covers. Shoes and stockings? Certainly. Believe me, I've had 'em come in and take off their shoes and put on a pair of slippers, pawn the shoes for fifty cents or so and go out in the slippers."

"More than that—I can remember many a woman, or girl coming in, pulling off shoes and stockings, hocking both for what I would give, and then going out of the place barefoot. That was in warm weather, of course, and yes—well—it was before prohibition, too, come to think of it."

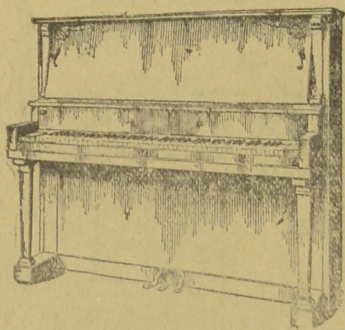
