The construction of this road, involving as it did an outlay of upwards of six million dollars, was a big undertaking for the small province of New Brunswick and the interest charge to be borne each year will be equivalent to a tax of dollar per head upon every man, woman and child of the population. The road is now being operated by the Federal Government on a forty per cent basis, but unless something is done to increase the traffic receipts it will be some years before New Brunswick's share of the earnings will come anyways near meeting the annual interest charge upon the bonds. The Premier is anxious that the promise made to the people by the Old Government, that the road be extended to Grand Falls, should be carried out; but shrewd and far-sighted business man that he is, he wants to see day light ahead before taking on further financial obligations. 
