THE ART OF MENDING.

Our grandmothers knew much more about mending and renovating and restoring than our mothers, and the chances are that our mothers knew more than we do. There came a time when things of all sorts were so cheap that it was hardly worth while to devote the time needed to mend old things. It was really wiser to discard the old and buy new. For instance, it would be foolish to spend an hour of time and a few cents worth of material to mend a tin pan that could be bought for 25 cents, for our time, even before the war, was worth at least 20 cents an hour, and then, besides an old mended tin is never as good as a new one. But when the same sort of tin pan costs 60 cents or more it is worth while to mend it. In fact, we have to mend it. And we should try to become so expert at mending that we can do it in half an hour.

This means that the housewife must take upon her shoulders a lot of new duties, duties known to our grandmothers but forgotten for a while. It means that she must learn how to do small jobs of mending furniture, replacing screws and tacks, securing loose willow and using glue. It means that she must know how to mend glass and china that will not have to be soaked for long in water; that she will have to learn the knack of mending hose, rubber tubes, hot water bags and rubber overshoes with rubber cement; that she will have to know the best way of darning and mending linen silk and woolen. Lace she will have also to mend for this is extremely high. Carpets, rugs and matings come in for more of her attention and this a source of much saving.

WAYS WITH TOMATOES.

STUFFED.

Tomatoes stuffed with green corn make a tasty entree. Boil good sized ears of corn for three or four minutes when it is cool enough to handle cut off kernels, scoring the corn through each vertical row, then cutting it off and scraping it from the cob. Then mix with the pulp taken from the inside of tomatoes. Season with butter, salt and pepper, fill the tomato shells and cover with the slice taken from the top of the tomato. Turn a little hot water in a shallow baking pan and bake until the tomatoes are tender.

BAKED.

Slice ripe tomatoes rather thick, put into a shallow baking pan, cover thickly with minced green peppers, season with butter, salt and pepper and bake about ten minutes.

FILLING.

Baked stuffed tomatoes are very good if the following mixture is used: A tablespoonful of onion and a little minced parsley fried in butter and then stirred together with hot boiled rice or bread crumbs and cold minced chicken.

PORK CHOPS AND APPLES.

If you weary of fried pork chops try baking them in this fashion: Lay the chops in a baking pan rather thick chops are best) season and in the same pan lay quartered cored apples. Baste as they bake for about three-quarters of an hour in a slow oven, and you will find the shops delightfully tender and the flavors of the meat and apple make a delicious combination. Tart apples, of course, are preferable.
