

WAYS WITH TOMATOES.

STUFFED.

Tomatoes stuffed with green corn make a tasty entree. Boil good sized ears of corn for three or four minutes when it is cool enough to handle cut off kernels, scoring the corn through each vertical row, then cutting it off and cover with the slice taken from the top of the tomato. Turn a little hot water in a shallow baking pan and bake until the tomatoes are render.

BAKED.

Slice ripe tomatoes rather thick, put BARRISTER, NOTARY, ETC. nto a shallow baking pan, cover thick ly with minced green peppers, season with butter, salt and pepper and bake about ten minutes.

FILLING.

Baked stuffed tomatoes are very good if the following mixture is used: A tablespoonful of onion and a little minced parsley fried in butter and 2 then stirred together with hot boiled rice or bread crumbs and cold minced chicken

PORK CHOPS AND APPLES
