

## NORMAL SCHOOL WILL BE USED AS POLLING PLACE

CHANGE FROM CITY HALL  
IS MADE NECESSARY

Booths All on Ground Floor—  
Devon Will Vote at School  
—No Question of  
Taxation.

Sheriff J. B. Hawthorne, returning officer for York County, has announced that the polls for No. 1 Division, comprising that portion of the City of Fredericton west of Carleton street, will be located tomorrow in the Normal School instead of the City Hall. All nine booths will be located on the first floor and each will have its own means of entrance. This is the first election since the division of the city into two divisions instead of the old ward system, that the City Hall has not been the voting place. The huge increase in the number of voters on account of the addition of women's names to the list has caused this. It was found impossible to locate nine booths at the City Hall.

Voting for No. 2 Division will take place at the Court House as before.

At Devon School.  
In the Town of Devon the voting will take place at the school, which is centrally located. Voters of Barker's Point also will vote there. Throughout the country school-houses are generally being put to use as polling places as there will be no school-sessions on Saturday.

No Question of Taxation.  
No question of civic or municipal taxation enters into Saturday's election and no elector need stay away from the polls on that account. It said that a number of young women are being intimidated by the Opposition by being told that they will be taxed if they vote.

A. H. Bridges, Rhodes Scholar elect for Canada, who was in the city yesterday left this morning for St. John. Mr. Bridges intends leaving shortly for a few weeks visit with friends at Philadelphia. He will take up his residence at Oxford about the first of January.

Death of Harry W. Cox  
Harry W. Cox died last evening at his home, King Street after an illness of several years. He is survived by his father Thomas Cox and one sister Miss Lulu Cox. The funeral will take place Sunday afternoon with solemn service at St. Dunstan's Church at 2.30, by Rev. Father Carney. Interment will be made at the Hermitage.

To the Scrap Heap  
A well known Conservative said yesterday that there was some deadwood in his party that needed scraping, and that he was going to begin by scraping Pinder and Young from his ticket. He also said what the Opposition needed to be successful were new leaders with no political sins to answer for.

To Take Special Treatment  
Word has been received from Rev. A. W. Meahan, D. D. pastor of St. John the Baptist church, St. John, who left on Sunday night for Toronto. He had a consultation with Dr. Thomas J. Glover, of that city, whose recent alleged discovery of a serum for the treatment of cancer has aroused great interest. It is understood that Dr. Meahan will undergo treatment.

Going to Ontario  
A Moncton dispatch says that Rev. W. H. Barraclough, whose final year as pastor of Central Methodist Church in that city will close next June, has accepted an invitation to become pastor, of Cambridge street church, Lindsay, Ont., at the close of his term in Moncton. Rev. Mr. Barraclough was formerly pastor of Centenary church in St. John and attained wide popularity. He has preached in Fredericton having been Baccalaureate preacher of the U. N. B. convocation.

Burton School Destroyed  
The children of Burton for some time to come will have to attend school in a dwelling house altered to meet the purposes of a school building Wednesday morning when the teacher Miss Kathleen Rowan of Lincoln went to open the school she found the building in flames. Two boys who had put on a fire to take off the night chill in the building made so great a fire that the pipe was over-heated and the building set on fire. When Miss Rowan arrived the boys were away trying to get help. The building was totally destroyed.

Arrested U. S. Soldiers  
Moncton Times: Private Reginald Gallagher, of the 2nd Band, and Private Paul Campbell of the 4th Company, United States Coast Defence Artillery, Fort William, Maine, were apprehended at the C. N. R. depot on Tuesday. The young men had been given forty-eight hours' leave from their unit, and took it into their heads to come across the line. They arrived in Moncton and being without money, they accosted a Mr. Wedge at the depot, who took them in charge and lodged them in the local cells. Their commanding officer is being communicated with. Gallagher's home is in Turtle Creek, Albert Co., and Campbell belongs to Danforth, Maine.

## THE GOVERNMENT CAMPAIGN CLOSES WITH AN ESPECIALLY BRIGHT OUTLOOK FOR TICKETS

York and Sunbury Both Expected to be in Government Column  
Saturday Night—Opposition Organization Torn to Shreds  
by United Farmers in Parishes—City and Towns Strong  
for the Government—Great Meetings Held Last Night—  
Religious Canvass Injuring the Opposition Cause—Leader  
Baxter's Meeting Gave No Strength to His Party.

The provincial election campaign in this section of the province draws to its close with the supporters of the Foster Government confident of the return of Government tickets in the counties of York and Sunbury. The return of the Foster Government is taken for granted by even the most active workers of the Opposition. The question is what showing the Opposition can make in York County which they have claimed as their strongest position in the province.

Outside the province the return of the government led by Hon. W. E. Foster is forecasted even by outstanding Conservative newspapers and stock exchange bets are that it will be returned. Bets of the same nature are offered in this province with no takers.

Baxter Weakens Position Here  
The appearance of J. B. M. Baxter on the stump in Fredericton has not strengthened the position of the Opposition. The large gathering of electors who heard him at the Opera House noticed that he carefully avoided the real issues of the campaign the fact that the Opposition has not cleared the decks since the revelations before Royal Commissions during the past few years and has no platform on which to stand.

Maritime Union an Issue  
In Fredericton the open advocacy by Mr. Baxter of Maritime Union and the removal of the seat of provincial government from this city has told strongly against his party and its candidates in this county. Mr. Baxter's attitude toward that matter, although it is not in the realm of practicality has shown residents of this city and its vicinity that he is willing and eager to remove from Fredericton one of the chief causes of its position as a city.

Government Ticket to Win  
The situation in York County today indicates that the Government ticket will win. The United Farmers are conducting a campaign which has torn the Opposition to shreds in all sections but those immediately adjacent to Fredericton. This leaves the four supporters of the Opposition and their organization in doubt as to what vote they will receive in the parishes. In Fredericton, Devon and Marysville as well as McAdam there is a strong current of feeling in favor of the Government ticket which will overcome the majority of only a few hundred which the Opposition recorded in 1917.

Kick-Back to Religious Canvasses  
The canvasses on religious grounds

which have been used by women and others in this city and in parts of the county have had a decided kick-back. In Fredericton there have been several cases of women using this canvass being ordered from houses. Resort to this canvass has revealed the weakness of the cause of the Opposition party, and members of the organization having realized that more damage than benefit was being caused have tried to put the "soft pedal" on some of the more aggressive women.

Sore on McLeod  
H. F. McLeod, M. P., who has stumped the county for the Opposition ticket including his friend-enemy J. K. Pinder, has been an outspoken user of the religious and racial canvass. At Canterbury and at Durham Bridge he resorted to this recently. At Durham Bridge his stock has depreciated to a marked extent and electors are not backward in declaring that he has done serious injury to the cause of the Opposition in that section.

Grand Meeting at Harvey  
At Harvey last night one of the largest meetings ever held in that locality was addressed by Coun. Frank Coburn and J. B. Dickson of the Government ticket and G. T. Feeney, Coun. Coburn belongs in that part of the county representing Manners Sutton in the Municipal Council. He made an excellent address and will poll a big vote for the Government ticket there. Ex-Coun. David Essensa was in the chair. The meeting was most enthusiastic.

Other Meetings  
There was a great gathering in the interest of the Government candidates at Devon last night. The meeting was held in the Women's Institute Hall, Union Street. Maurice Perley occupied the chair. P. S. Watson of Devon, one of the Government candidates was given a great reception by his fellow townsmen and there is no doubt of the Government ticket being given a big majority at that poll. P. J. Hughes also spoke. Both were in excellent form and gave clear expositions of the issues of the campaign. An unusual feature of the meeting was the presence of Mrs. E. Atherton Smith of St. Andrew's who after speaking before a large meeting of women in Fredericton, spoke at Devon, where she made a magnificent impression.

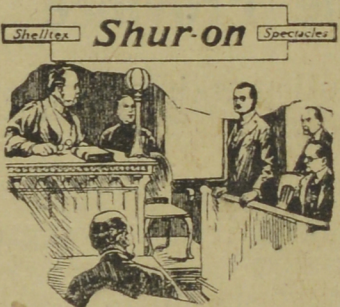
