## SUCCESSOR OF BORDEN AT THE PREMIER'S PLEASURE

Rumors Current at Ottawa—Resignation of Hon. N. W. Rowell Expected Shortly—Government is Leaning Strongly Toward Conservatives—Sir Robert in Conference With the Cabinet—Definite Policy May be Attempted.

Ottawa May 13—It has been practically declared, caucus being willing to let the matter of choosing a new Unionist leader remain in abeyance at the premier's pleasure. Sir Robert Borden was given four months to see if he could get well enough to perform the onerous duties of premiership. Now he is to have three or four months to see if he has become well enough to give to the job all the time it warrants. If he finds he suffers once again under the strain of office, he will resign and resign permanently. If, however, he bears up he will express his willingness to carry on. That is how the matter will be presented to the caucus. This decision if it is maintained, will be a great disappointment to many Conservatives. Some of these, who were at the round table conference with Hon. Robert Rogers have come to Ottawa and have been using all the influence they possess and could scrape up towards hearing the premier's resignation and getting a definition of policy along conservative lines. Various quasi-friendly counsels have been tendered the premier in an unofficial indirect manner that it would be better to throw up leadership while his prestige is high than run the chance of it suffering relapse by the vicissitudes of a longer term. In any case whether the premier stays or goes it seems that policy will average more and more decidedly towards conservatism. There will be no such declaration as that would mean an immediate split up.

Rowell's Resignation  
Gossip especially busies itself with the name of Hon. N. W. Rowell, whose resignation is predicted either as a protest against making Union permanent, or against a final decision to consider Union a Tory affair. It is more likely that his resignation will come as soon as he secures the passage of legislation in which he has taken an active interest and which he considers part of reconstruction.

With Cabinet  
Sir Robert met morning and afternoon with the cabinet today. He talks of feeling in fine fettle for work, but the test is still ahead of him. The budget is getting his very earnest consideration in view of the proposals made by various business interests. One recent proposal submitted to which business is adverse is a tax on capital. The advocates of this tax say that it would prevent stock watering. The western Unionist members do not expect any reductions of importance on the tariff. Most of them have decided to support the proposals unless they are flagrantly out of tune with western sentiment by raising duties, it is almost certain that a minority will vote against the government.

From two to half a dozen of them may cross the floor but that action has been made difficult for them by the fact that the no-mans-land, hitherto existing between the National Progressive party and the Liberal opposition has disappeared in the anxiety of those farthest from the speaker to get nearer. It is doubtful whether they will care to go to the farthest end of the chamber just to emphasize their disapproval. The theory is propounded that it is possible to be independent and still remain on the government side.

### NEXT YEAR'S SUBJECTS

Announcement Made at Encaenia Exercises Thursday—City of Fredericton Medal for Organic Chemistry.

During the U. N. B. encaenia it was announced that the subject for the City of Fredericton Gold Medal in 1921 would be Senior Organic Chemistry.

The subject for the English essay for the Douglas Gold Medal was announced as "The Development of the English Novel".

The passage of English prose to be translated into Latin prose for the Alumni Gold Medal was announced as Smith's History of Greece, Chapter 20, sections 4 and 5.

## CRISIS IN SITUATION AT NEW YORK

New York, May 14—The full force of the tie-up of the freight movement road men and the strike of coastwise longshoremen was felt in New York today.

Thousands of loaded cars stood idle in the terminal yards, while industries suffered from shortage of fuel and raw materials and food supplies were running low.

The United States Grain Corporation today came to the aid of bakers faced with an acute flour shortage by supplying flour from reserve stocks held for export. Sufficient flour is held in storehouses in Manhattan and Brooklyn to meet all immediate needs of the city, the Grain Corporation announced.

Coal companies reported they were receiving practically no coal. During this season coal companies usually filled their bins for the rush later but coal movement has been at a standstill for weeks.

Although railroad officials reported their men returning to work, and freight movement gradually increasing, reports from many large concerns today were that their freight shipments were not being handled.

The National Biscuit Company declared railroads have been able to do but little to relieve the congestion and are promising no relief. The J. B. Bode Coal Company officials declared they had received no shipments for several weeks at a time when they were normally loading their bins to capacity. Freight cars, destined for New York loaded with freight either for domestic consumption or distribution or for export, are delivered at the terminals but because of the lack of switchmen the railroads are unable to deliver the cars to their final destination.

Conferences were in progress looking to a settlement of the strike of coastwise longshoremen. Both sides reported prospects bright for an early agreement. This would considerably relieve the freight congestion in the New York terminal as it would result in handling of freight consigned to coast points, now piled up here.

## C CLASS WON FROM B CLASS

Yesterday afternoon, celebrating the half-holiday "C" Class of the Fredericton High School won a decided victory over "B" Class of the same school by a score of 19 to 5. Until the fifth inning the game was fast and indecisive but after time time "C" Class ran away with the game. Currie, the pitcher of "C" Class, was the star of the game having fourteen strikeouts to his credit. "B" Class had a fairly good pitching staff but they could do little to stop the offensive hitting of the "C" Class batters. The batteries were Currie and Davidson for "C" Class, while Jacobson, Kane and Skeene performed for "B". The game was not as uninteresting as the score would indicate a number of fast plays being made by both teams. The game was satisfactorily umpired by Don Millican.

This is the second time that "C" Class has overwhelmed "B" the score in the former game being 9 to 5.
