SOCIALIST RED RECEIVED SETBACK AT CONVENTION

National Gathering at New York Voted Against Radical Declaration of Principles by 103 to 33—Proletarian Dictatorship Not Wanted by Berger—Much Bitterness Displayed in the Discussions.

New York, May 14—The "Red Flag Internationalists" of the Socialist party of America went down to their first real defeat in the party's National convention here.

By the decisive vote of 103 to 33, the convention crushed "radical" declaration of principles submitted by the delegation from Illinois which provided for the "dictatorship of the proletariat" and limitation of citizenship throughout the United States.

Bitterness of invective marked the day-long debate between the "conservative" forces of Morris Hillquit of New York and the "Radicals" led by S. Louis Engdahl of Chicago.

"You are afraid of the dictatorship of the proletariat," shouted Engdahl in closing the debate on the Illinois measure. "Yet you have the dictatorship of Palmer, Wilson and Burleson. You can't fool anybody by phrases nor can you fool anybody with the decorations of this convention hall, the American flag, the flag of Wall Street, and the dictatorship of Wilson."

James Oneal of Brooklyn, arguing for the victorious Hillquit "conservative" platform bitterly arraigned the word "dictatorship."

"Let it go through the country that you favor a dictatorship of the proletariat and you cease to be a political party," he said. "Bourgeois Democracy with all its shams and illusions per-

mits in normal times decision by an honest and fair discussion. To espouse the dictatorship program would turn every such democracy into an absolute autocracy."

Victor L. Berger, unseated Representative in Congress from Milwaukee under a 20-year sentence for violation of the Espionage act, declared that for 40 years the Socialist party had not talked a language the people of the country could understand.

"I don't believe in any dictatorship," he said. "I want democracy, not the dictatorship of the proletariat."

ENGLISH GIRL WEDDED INDIAN, ANOTHER WIFE

Second Wife With Her Child Came to Canada from England—Husband on Reservation.

Warton, May 14—A pitiable aftermath of a war-time marriage in England has, if it is correctly reported, been brought to light here today. Early in the war Laurence Keeshig, a member of the Cape Croker Indian band enlisted went overseas and was wounded while on active service. While convalescing he became acquainted with a beautiful English maiden, and later it is said, succeeded in having her go through a form of marriage with him.

Keeshig, who is a well-educated Indian, having graduated from the local High School, speaks English fluently and is possessed of a personality that would make a favorable impression.

Late Saturday evening the English girl arrived here with a babe several months old. The latter is a beautiful, happy child and apparently shows no trace of Indian ancestry, being of a very blonde type. Keeshig met the couple at the train and they have remained at a local hotel, not being taken to his home on the Indian Reserve for reason, it is alleged that at that point resides an Indian wife with two or three children, whom he left behind when he went overseas.

Just what will be the outcome of the situation cannot yet be conjectured, as the English girl is keeping her own counsel and says little or nothing to any townspeople. Her plight has aroused the sympathy of all and any assistance that can be given her will be rendered with despatch. So far as can be ascertained, no officials of the law have been notified or received any instructions regarding the case.

It is rumored that the English girl has cabled to her family, who are said to be very well to do, and it is deemed probable that she may slip quietly away without causing any trouble to her erring Indian lover.

HIGH COSTS BRING ABOUT CANCELLATION

Lawrence, Mass., May 14—The smaller textile mills of the city are facing one of the most trying periods in their history, because of the number of cancellations of orders which are being received. The high cost of material plus the high wages demanded by the mill employees, making for increased cost of manufactured goods is given as the direct cause of the cancellations.

The cancellations are giving the mill agents much deep thought, as many of the mills have not fully recovered from the cancellations made by the United States Government after the armistice. What effect the cancellations will have cannot as yet be determined, but one mill man, in an interview, said that the high notch has been reached in regard to increases in wages.

Never since the start of the war have there been so many unemployed looking for work. Wages have increased so rapidly that the mill men feel that this is the main reason for the huge advance in the price of goods.

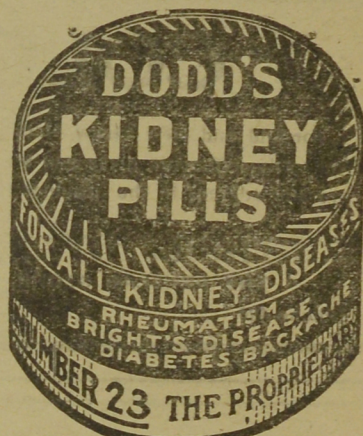
