

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS

THE NEW BRUNSWICK ELECTRIC POWER COMMISSION.

Tenders will be received by the above named Commission up to noon, 21st day of September, A. D. 1920, for the following work:

1. The construction of an earth dam across the East Branch of the Musquash River, including spillway intake, by-pass, etc., and the grading of a bed to carry a penstock from the damsite to the power house.

2. The construction of an earth dam across the West Branch of the Musquash River, including the items named above, together with the construction of a canal and the grading for the penstock from the damsite to the power house above mentioned.

3. The construction of an earth dam across the Shogomoc River, including items named above, together with the construction of a canal and grading for the penstock from the damsite to the power house.

Sites one and two are situated about twelve miles from St. John and about one mile from the line of the New Brunswick Southern Railway.

Site three is situated about 40 miles North from Fredericton on the line of the St. John and Quebec Railway.

A certified cheque for 5 per cent. of the estimated cost of the work must be attached to tenders.

AROUND THE TOWN THE FREEDOM

OF SEASHORE

Almost everyone has heard the story about the car that ran twenty miles and then stopped and when examined proved to have no engine. A Devon motorist recently found out, however, that a car cannot run without a gas-tank, at least not very long. He was returning from the St. John Exhibition with a party which he had taken down from his city. Some miles out of the "Foggy City" the car stopped with a certain degree of suddenness. There was a hurried examination of the "inards" without disclosing anything wrong but when the rear of the car was examined it was found that the gasoline tank was not in evidence. It had fallen off. The party which was in a hurry to get home stayed right there for several hours. The errand tank was found on the road some distance back.

NEW TYPE OF
BRITISH COAST
DEFENCE SHIP

(Special to the Daily Mail. Copyright) Shoreham, Sussex, Eng. Sept. 17—Two weird looking tower ships designed in 1918 as surprises for the Germans and built at a cost of \$9,250,000 apiece are to be launched shortly. They have concrete hulls and sixty foot steel towers equipped with search lights and other mysterious apparatus. The hulls are to rest on the seabed while the towers rise above. The ships were to be used for coast defence.

London, Sept. 17—The freedom of the seas is undisputed so far at least as the humble individual is concerned. But a new question has arisen—who owns the seashore?

A dispute is in progress at Freshwater in the Isle of Wight because the owners of the bathing huts on the beach charge bathers who do not use them the sum of three-pence for crossing the beach to the sea. They are said to do so on the ground that the beach belongs to them.

This has raised a big question, and the answer will surprise if it does not dismay the hosts of bathers and non-bathers who habitually walk over and sit upon the beach, and, incidentally, eat there with seaside appetite fresco and satisfying luncheons.

A prominent barrister being asked to state the rights of the public to the beach, replied:

"With one exception they have none. The public has undoubted right to navigate and fish in the sea, and, as a consequence, the bare right to cross the beach to reach the sea for that purpose. They have no right to walk over it or use it in any other way."

"The reason for this is that the 'foreshore' (which is that part of the beach which lies between high and low-water mark) belongs to the Crown or to those to whom the Crown has granted it. It is private property, and although, when the sea covers it, you may sail and row and fish over it; when it is dry you must not—in law—even walk on it. When the tide flows over it you may capture the fish in it, but when the tide recedes you may not carry away even a single wrinkle."

GRAND TRUNK
ARBITRATION

Ottawa, Sept. 16—The preliminaries of the Grand Trunk arbitration will begin next Monday when the arbitration will start on a physical inspection of the company's system and terminals. Sir Walter Cassels, Hon. W. H. Taft and Sir Thomas White who compose the board will go from Montreal to Chicago first and afterwards, it is intimated over the Grand Trunk Pacific to the coast. The date for com-

mencing the court process in the arbitration has not been decided but it will probably be early in November. The arbitration will take several months. It will determine the value of the common stock of the company and much evidence on the subject will be introduced.

Just as the arbitration board is starting out from Montreal westward the directors of the Canadian National will leave Montreal Monday to inspect the eastern lines of the system.
