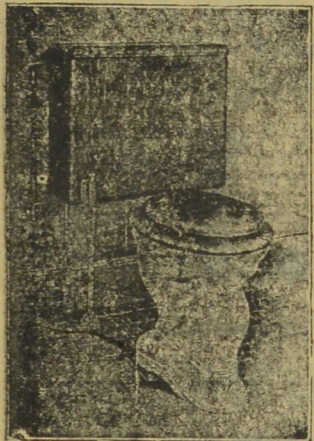

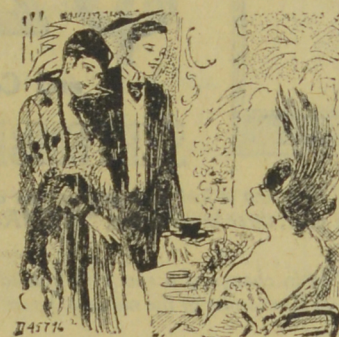

BRIDE'S YEAR AT THE
UNIVERSITY OF LONDON

Will Grant Diplomas to Prospective Brides who Pursue a Course of Study—Subjects to be Studied Will Include a General Knowledge of Household Management.

London, Sept. 2.—(By Mail.) Any British young woman about to marry—or with no notion of marrying, for that matter—may now go to the University of London enter King's College for Women, take a brand new course of study known as "Bride's Year," and in due time become the proud possessor of the "Brides Diploma."

Bride's Year has a curriculum unlike anything ever offered women in an English university; and young women from many parts of Great Britain are flocking in to take the studies.

The subjects of study for the Bride's Year include a general knowledge of household management—budgets, laundry work and house-wifery; physiology. It is particularly interesting and certain very business-like. It includes book-keeping and accounts generally; banking cheques, and all negotiations of monies; shorthand, typewriting, interviews, committee work, and other foundations of business training about which the average woman knows all too little.

The development of this far-reaching conception in the education of women by a great English university is thoroughly indicative of a new order of things which has lately come into British life as a by-product of the war. The British matron of the past was a notable housewife. Famous were her recipes for gooseberry wine, black current jam and plum pudding, not to mention "toad in the hole," "bubble and squeak," and other delicious dishes with extraordinary names. Mistress Primrose, wife of the good old Vicar of Wakefield was a simple soul who could scarcely add up her meagre household accounts, but her domestic accomplishments enabled her to evolve family comfort and plenty from her husband's all too modest stipend.

Other times other manners. There came a day in England when pretentiousness and snobbery pushed the homely virtues out of place, and both Madame and Miss sought ease instead of usefulness, and show rather than solidity. Work, especially housework was scorned as something plebeian. Just before the War, the head mistress of a school for the daughters of comfortable middle-class people told me she had been forced to discontinue a domestic science course, which was part of the school's curriculum, because there was no demand for it. "On the contrary," she said "mothers re-

sent the idea of their girls learning housework. 'I don't want my daughter taught servants' work' is a frequent comment.

Household Efficiency

The last few years have witnessed a decided return to the older viewpoint. Loss of income, the impossibility of getting servants, and the newly awakened activity of women of all classes have combined to make household efficiency a desired and sought accomplishment. Colleges and schools are featuring domestic science, and the demand for trained instructors far exceeds the supply. And now a final touch of dignity is given to the subject by the Household and Social Science Department of King's College for Women.

As the Dean of the Department said to me: "Most women are appallingly ignorant of elementary business affairs and it is always to their own disadvantage. Such instruction should be included in the education of every girl, no matter what she is going to do in life. Whether she is going to be married or to follow any particular career, the knowledge will still be useful."

A third choice of a one year's course covers "Home Nursing" and is very full and thorough. The subjects of study include practical and theoretical physiology; hygiene lectures, with visits to and practical work at infant welfare centres; biology, bacteriology and pharmacology; cookery, particularly invalid and infant cookery; and laundry work of the finest type.

The girl who takes all three courses is not only thoroughly equipped for domestic life, she is fully qualified as a teacher of domestic science; and every encouragement is given to clever ambitious girls to take the complete training.

"The Diploma Course is our great aim, and the three years' training is really necessary for a girl contemplating a professional career in Household or Social Science," said the Dean. "Many girls are precluded from entering upon a three years' course, however, and, for such the special one year course has been initiated. It must stimulate and widen interest in those subjects with which women are particularly concerned, and is especially useful for those who wish to prepare themselves for the efficient management of their own homes."

"All such training, whether for one year or three is, also, of course, eminently useful to women who have no idea of getting married. In no case can our training ever be regarded as wasted. It all makes for the progress of women and the betterment of the world it gives women a fuller interest in life and a clearer understanding of life values."

U. S. FASHION
BUYERS ARE
VERY SHY

Paris, Sept. 2. (By mail.)—Paris dressmakers are complaining that the American buyers who are here for the Autumn exhibitions of the gown models are buying practically nothing. In other years, most of the buyers would buy from fifteen to twenty models from each Paris house, but this year they are buying one or two and in some cases none at all.

The buyers declare the French dresses are priced too high. The simplest gown offered them here, they say, would cost at least \$400 by the time the customs duty was paid in New York. It would have to be sold at \$500 in America for the purchaser to break even after paying expenses here. And American women, they declare, will not pay \$500 for a simple dress, no matter how wealthy they may be.

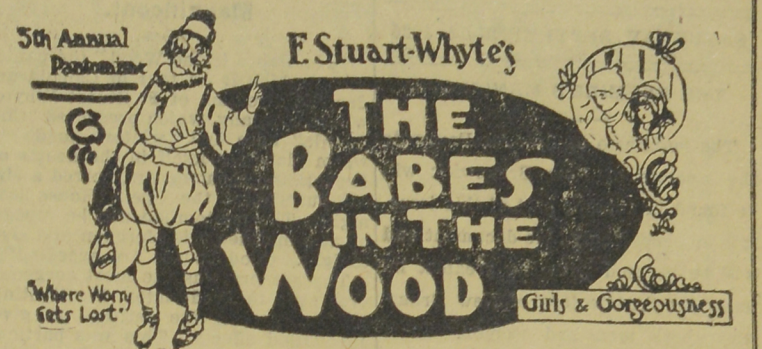
