## THE PREMIER'S MANIFESTO

The manifesto of Premier Foster to the electors of New Brunswick will be found in another part of this issue. It is an exceedingly able document and will be perused with the greatest interest by the electors of New Brunswick, both men and women. In a modest way the Premier sets forth the achievements of his government since it took office on the 4th day of April 1917. It is a story of honest and capable administration, development and progress, related in a simple and straightforward manner. No government in the history of the province has appealed to the people with such an honorable record of achievement. When Premier Foster and his colleagues took office they found the affairs of the province in a chaotic condition. There had been scandal upon scandal, the credit of the province was impaired, and it had become a by-word in the other provinces of Canada. By prudent and business-like administration all this has been changed, and the province has once more been put firmly upon its feet.

The Foster Government has faithfully carried out its pre-election promises; its administrative record has been sound and honest, and there is not the slightest doubt but that the people on October 9th will express their appreciation of the good work accomplished in their behalf, by returning it to power by a decisive majority.

## A REFORM GOVERNMENT

The Foster administration during its three and one-half years in office passed so many useful acts that it is difficult to compile a list without some omissions. In referring yesterday to the government's achievements on behalf of the people, the Mail omitted to give Premier Foster and his colleagues credit for reforming the jury system, increasing the pay of petit jurors and providing remuneration for those who are called upon to serve on grand juries. In former times men who were called from their homes to serve on juries, often at a personal sacrifice, were paid the munificent sum of one dollar per day. This remuneration was fixed by our forefathers in the dim, distant past, and was regarded by former governments as unalterable. Every man who served to a jury under previous governments did so at a financial loss. The Foster government changed all this. Jurors are now paid \$3 per day in addition to mileage and it is none too much, considering the important service they perform. Under the old government juries were quite frequently selected by Tory lawyers who had cases pending in the courts. Today they are selected by an independent board composed of the County Judge, the sheriff and secretary-treasurer, by means of the card system. Thanks to the Foster administration the professional jurymen and court house warmers have been entirely eliminated in connection with the administration of justice. For instituting this important work the government is deserving of the greatest credit.

Sir George E. Foster the old war horse of the Tory party, has been hustled off to Colchester and St. John to stump for the Cabinet Ministers now seeking re-election. This would seem to indicate that the Government regards the situation as serious.

# BABES IN THE WOOD GORGEOUS PRODUCTION

Scored Big Success at Opera House Last Night—Scenic Effects and Costuming Magnificent.

"The Babes in the Wood," the pantomime which is on tour of Canada under the direction of F. Stuart Whyte, whose company, which presented "Cinderella" here last winter, made a warm place for itself in the hearts of Fredericton theatregoers, scored a signal success at the Opera House last night. The pantomime will be repeated at a matinee this afternoon and also tonight. Good houses are expected.

The scenery was the most gorgeous ever seen in Fredericton, the lighting combining with the settings to give unequalled effects. This was particularly true of the Cupid's Garden scene, although Ye Olde Post of Plymouth and the Forest of Fear were most realistic.

The richness of the costuming caused general admiration. This was particularly noticeable in the scene "Opportunity," originated by F. Stuart Whyte, in which the girls of the chorus represented Canada and her various subdivisions. This scene drew forth round upon round of applause.

The chorus singing was much better than in the usual road company of the class, special pains evidently having been taken with the company upon its organization in Toronto. The bits of comedy worked in from time to time were up to the minute and were put over well. All through the performance a special appeal was made to the national feeling of a Canadian audience.

Returned men who had seen "The Babes in the Wood" at some of the big London theatres in pantomime seasons during the war, were carried overseas in spirit by last night's performance. Many Old Country songs were sung.

The juvenile members of the cast made friends for themselves at once, little Misses Dorothy Mackay and May Strachan as the Babes and little Gloria Thompson as Cupid with his bow. George Summers as Captain Kidd had the chief comedy role and made the audience roar. Tom Ellis as Dick Turpin also was good. They were excellently supplemented by Reginald Hincks and Victor Dyer as the Baron and the Aunt, the former semi-wicked and the latter very wicked. These made an admirable quartette and were heard in several selections which gave a very breezy tone to the whole production. Miss Harriet Fawn as the landlady and Charles Cardel as Mountebank, were most effective. The character of the Prince of Utopia—Robin Hood was well portrayed by Miss Mona Warren, and that of Dame Marion was ably interpreted by Miss Edith Playfair.

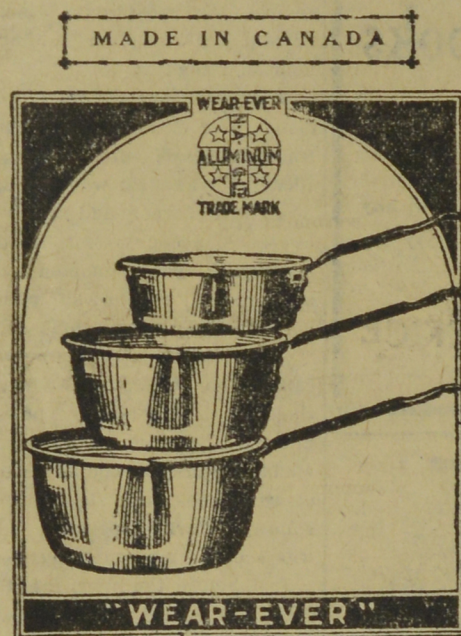

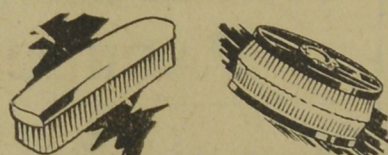

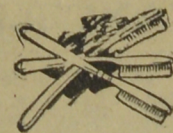
