markets. It is our function of fully represent the views of the people and through legislative action to make there views operative. To this end we invite the opinions and co-operation of the farmer of this province that we may work together towards a policy of agricultural development that will make our country the envy of our neighbors.

### Workmen's Compensation Board

The Workmen's Compensation Board provided for by legislation passed in the early days of this government has been of wonderful help and assistance not only to the workmen generally but to employers as well. Under its provisions every man employed in industries or on construction works in the province is not only protected but compensated for accidental injuries. The workman no longer has to meet his employer in a court of law in order to obtain compensation for injuries received in his service and the mother or widow deprived by accidental death of the support of her son or husband, is now promptly and generously compensated from the funds of the Compensation Board without having to go to law to seek redress. Free hospital and medical treatment to the injured and a generous proportion of wages while he is unable to work are among the chief features of this plan, which enables every employee to think that in the event of accident or death to himself those who are relying upon him will not be dependent for support upon charity or other assistance.

The preparation of this Workmen's Compensation Act and the amendments thereto have been but a small part of the work of the Department of Justice. In addition to carrying on the more important criminal cases of the country personally the Attorney-General has bent his entire energies towards notable improvements in the statutes of the province. The amendments to the Succession Duties Act, County Court and Probate Court Acts and the far-reaching benefits to the public from the new Jury Act, which gives such additional protection to impartial tribunals in the courts, are among those worthy of mention.

### The Health Department

It is not necessary to dwell upon the importance of health to the public at large. Without it, all interests suffer, the commercial, the mechanical, the agricultural, the industrial, and no government can consider itself as performing its full duty to its constituents which does not make this interest one of its foremost activities.

We found on assuming office, New Brunswick the most backward of all in regards attention to the physical welfare of her people, and we have given her a health administration which, within two years, has cleared the province of smallpox; has rendered nearly the whole school population immune to that disease; has established public health as the most vital and important interest of the people; has linked it up with every other Canadian province in a combined combat against disease, disability and physical distress.

We have provided for the medical examinations of every school in the province, no matter how isolated, how remote, or how numerically insignificant.

For the first time in its history, the province now knows with fair accuracy the rate at which its people are born, and the extent of deaths among them and the cause of its ravages.

Marriage has become a matter of strict and, essentially complete governmental record; to the untold benefit, legal and social, of the generation coming after us. Indeed, it is not too much to say that the system for the collection of vital statistics so lately begun under the Department of Health, bids fair within a year or two, to become the most complete and reliable of any in North America.

The control and eradication of the so-called "social diseases" than which no greater menace exists to the life and well-being of the people; the combatting of tuberculosis in which notable progress has already been made; the erection and maintenance of rural and cottage hospitals in conjunction with the Provincial Red Cross Society the intensive care given to child welfare; the widespread instruction of the people concerning methods of hygienic living; and the betterment and perfection of the health measures already adopted and in operation to which allusion has been made will form some of the chief activities of this department in the coming years. In this connection it has been and will continue to be the constant aim of the department to associate itself with all voluntary and philanthropic societies looking to social and physical welfare, and to cheerfully and gratefully avail itself of their services.

The government therefore, in contemplating this department so lately established and so vigorously and wisely directed—even in the face, at first of many prejudices and much misgiving—have great satisfaction in presenting its claims of support to the

people, and confidence that that support will not be denied to it.

### Education and Teachers' Salaries

Education, one of the greatest of the public services has suffered more from changed conditions arising out of the war than any other. The salaries of teachers a few years ago were not sufficient to live upon and in order to prevent wholesale desertion of teachers from educational services, a committee was appointed by the legislature to investigate and report. The result was an act increasing the government grant and salaries of teachers making it possible for the poorer districts to receive greater consideration and assistance. It is to be hoped that this additional financial inducement will make the profession more attractive to our young people and enable the youth of the country to receive that instruction which is absolutely necessary for the well being and prosperity of any province.

Vocational education has been given a great impetus by the appointment of a Vocational Board which, taking advantage of the assistance given by the federal government in co-operation with the provincial authorities, is establishing schools in different centres of the province, thus giving an opportunity to many ambitious young men and women to obtain such industrial education as will better fit them for the battle of life.

### Water Power Development

The development of the water powers of New Brunswick is a part of the policy of this government and I consider it necessary to receive the approval of the electorate for the large expenditure involved for this purpose before it is finally undertaken. Our water powers are part of the provincial wealth and when they are developed this country will be enriched, for power stimulates progress and much available power means large industries, much employment and much production. Production of course, means exports and exports will bring money into the country and prosperity to the people. New Brunswick needs developed power to convert her natural resources into merchandise, to give power to the farmers in their agricultural production, to give light to homes where none is now available. We have tremendous water powers at Grand Falls which only need time and money to harness them. We have several very large pulp and paper corporations only awaiting this water power development to enable them to organize great industries that will mean much to the people in the northern part of the province.

The government has determined upon the development of the tremendous water powers at Grand Falls; whatever is needed to bring this about will be done. The dominion water power engineer Mr. K. H. Smith, who has done so much to encourage the development of water power in the sister province of Nova Scotia has given largely of his time and ability to produce the same splendid results in New Brunswick, and this public acknowledgement is due him. Tenders for the work in connection with the development at Musquash and Shogomoc have already been advertised and in a short time there is no doubt but that work will be begun on these most important projects. In the meantime the water power commission and its engineer will investigate all probable water powers within the province, in order that every community with such a natural advantage may be assisted to obtain all benefits to be derived from it and undoubtedly as a result of this investigation there will be many water powers throughout the province developed with government assistance and under government control for the use of the people and light, heat and power distributed at a reasonable cost.

## AN AIRPLANE FOR PRESIDENT

Paris, Sept. 17.—The government is purchasing an aeroplane for the President of France. It is of the limousine type with a special pilot and mechanic in constant attendance so that the President may never be delayed. President Deschanel has yet to make his initial trip, and wags are suggesting fears that a fall from it might be more serious than from a moving train.

## A STRIKE IN BRUSSELS

Brussels, Sept. 17.—Singers, musicians and stagehands in Antwerp opera houses are on strike as a result of the city's refusal to meet their demands for increased wages. The city is dependent on travelling companies.
