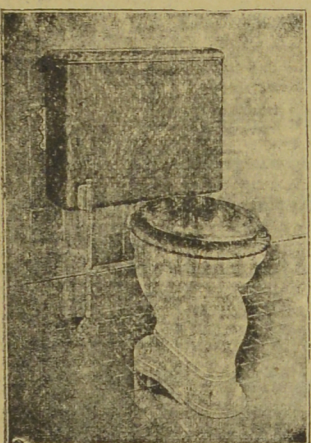

PUBLIC PALATE TICKLED  
BY DECLINE OF PRICES

Recent Drop in Sugar Price was Not Deep Enough—No Apparent Danger of the Public Getting a Sweet Thing at a Low Price—The Stabilizers Should be Eliminated Before Any Tangible Reduction Can be Looked For.

(Toronto Globe.)

Announced decreases in the prices of necessities continue to tickle the public palate. They have not yet had much effect upon the public purse. They will come later, unless the process of "stabilizing" now reported to be under way in regard to sugar is applied to the falling prices of other commodities.

Signs of a drop in the retail price of sugar that would bring it to a level where its use for household preserving and canning would not seem like extravagance were hailed with delight by the consuming public. For them, however, the drop has not been deep enough. Certain other interested parties hold a contrary view, and are taking steps accordingly. Their process is summed up in the word "stabilizing." It is a simple matter apparently. Word goes around that there is danger of the public getting too much of a sweet thing at a low price. Imagine the disturbing results of such an innovation! It would be dangerous to the mental equilibrium of the nation. What is to be done? The stabilizers rally to the rescue; and stabilization is resorted to without loss of time. In the present instance a Montreal despatch says that the stabilizing will hold the best grades of granulated sugar at 22 cents a pound, with the other grades in proportion. But can sugar stay thus stabilized in Canada while in the United States it is selling at 17 cents a pound.

Flour too, is on the down grade. Cheaper bread should follow if the stabilizers are not too influential in their own interests. Prices for the new crop spring wheat flour are recorded as from \$1.10 to \$1.80 a barrel lower, according to grade, then the Government standard flour was selling at. The despatch breaking this news to the people adds: "The price for first patents was announced at \$13.75 with similar reductions all along the line for various grades used by bakers. The millers also announced a decline of 60 cents a barrel in the price of Government standard spring wheat flour to \$14.25 a barrel."

Following announcements of reductions in several lines of woollens and their productions as well as in ocean freight rates the problem of making the average purse meet the cost of living begins to appear capable of solution. The crest of high prices seem to have been passed, unaccompanied by the violent break and the panicky slump predicted by the pessimists. If with a decline in prices there is an improvement in the quantity and quality of production, the prospects of indefinitely continuing the period of steady employment at good wages would be very bright. The world is and will for a long time be in need of manufactured goods and food.

Meanwhile a wideopen and thorough probe of the sugar situation would not be amiss. How much more are the people paying for it then they ought to pay? Why confine the inquiry to the cost of producing sugar and the price at which it is sold? It is true, or is it only a fairy tale, that sugar by-products—molasses, rum, alcohol fertilizer syrup etc.—bring more

profits to the refineries than sugar itself? The people want to know and they ought to know regardless of the stabilizers and their methods.

TRADE WITH  
WEST INDIES

A booklet on "The British West Indies and British Guiana" just issued by the Bank of Montreal, is a most timely publication in view of the new trade agreement between Canada and the West Indies now awaiting the ratification of the respective governments. The booklet gives a concise and interesting description of the salient features of the various Colonies which are party to the agreement including the physical characteristics, area, population and principal exports and imports. It shows that there are most promising markets awaiting development by enterprising Canadian merchants and industrial firms.

At the present time, it is stated, the British West Indies, British Guiana and British Honduras have a total population of over 2,000,000 with natural resources that have really only just begun to be developed. For instance, it is officially estimated that there are at least 20,000,000 acres of fertile lands in the British West Indies not yet beneficially occupied, whereas the area under cultivation is only one and a half million acres.

The opinion is expressed that under the system of preference granted by Canada and the United Kingdom, and with the growing world-demand for such commodities as the West Indies produce, the development of these Colonies will proceed apace. There is every prospect of considerable and progressive increase of the population. If all the fertile land there were brought under cultivation the Colonies which are in the new agreement could easily support a population of between 30,000,000 and 50,000,000. Even at the present time the interchange of natural products between Canada and the British West Indies is only a tithe of what it well might be, and probably will be, with the larger preference now advocated and the much-improved steamship services provided for.

The booklet gives Canadians an excellent idea of the directions in which trade may be extended. It is replete with detailed and authoritative information of the imports and exports of the various Colonies, and gives most useful information as to the best methods to be pursued in getting into touch with the local business houses and building up trade relations.

The fact that the Bank of Montreal is now directly represented in the British West Indies, through its alliance with the Colonial Bank, places this institution in an advantageous and authoritative position for assisting Canadian firms in their trade relations with the various Colonies.

The booklet has a map showing the relative positions of Canada and the Colonies which are parties to the agreement. Copies may be obtained free from any branch of the Bank of Montreal.
