When it begins to thicken add one cupful of cooked carrot cut in dice and one cupful of cooked celery cut in small pieces Let the vegetables get heated through and serve hot Carrots and green peas are another good combination creamed

Plums and crabapples make a delicious jelly. (Wash and stew each fruit separately. Add a little water to each and stew until soft. Drain juice through a firm strainer like heavy cheesecloth. Measure and use equal quantities of each. To every two cup fuls of plum and every two cupfuls of crabapple allow three and a half cupfuls of flour stirred smooth in it. Add before being added to the boiling juice. Skim thoroughly and boil until it leaves a thick coating on end of a silver spoon which when nearly cool will "wrinkle" when pushed along by a finger nail. This is a good test for all jellies. Be sure it "wrinkles" and pushes ahead of the finger nail. Pour into sterilized glasses. When cool cover with paraffine and keep in a cool and

GRAPE CATSUP.

Take two and a half quarts of grapes ash mash a few in preserving kettle cover and cook until very soft. Strain hrough a coarse strainer which will emove the seeds but allow some of the softened skins to go through. Add wo pounds of sugar, one pint of vine one tablespoonful each of cloves nnamon and allspice. Boil until thick nough. Seal like hot preserves.

PEACH MARMALADE.

Take two pounds of peaches, and if the skins do not peel off easily plunge fruit into boiling water. Cut fruit in small pieces, add two cupfuls of water and cook until fruit is soft. Rub through a sieve, add one and a half pounds of sugar (three cupfuls) which has been heated juice of one lemon about twenty minutes, taking care i does not burn down. Pour into steril ized glasses. When cool cover with

For peach jelly take the strained peach and lemon juice, boil down, then add an equal quantity of sugar.

BAKED PORK CHOPS.

Take the required number and place in a baking pan, add a slice of onion to each chop with a little salt and pepper then pour a little water in a pan and bake until fat is crisp. Do not put in enough water so the meat steams in stead of baking. The pork and onion is an especially good combination.
