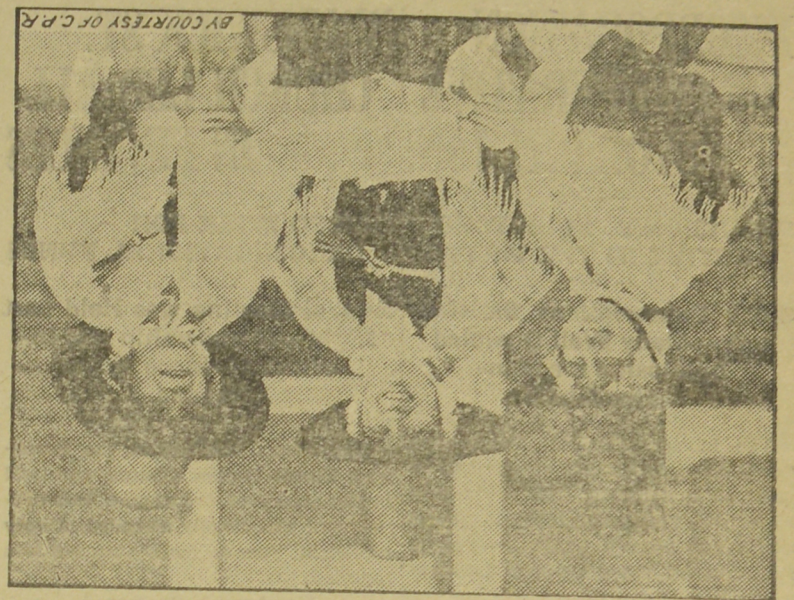
We have supreme faith in the resistance and vitality of the public. Having weathered 1919, its neck will stand any assault 1920 can make on it.
