

### INCORPORATION OF CO-OPERATIVE STORE IN JAN.

#### PROVISIONAL DIRECTORS ACTIVE IN THE MATTER

Stock Subscriptions Satisfactory—Many Well Qualified Applicants for Managership.

The incorporation of Fredericton Cooperative, Limited is expected to be gazetted this month. The provisional board of directors appointed several weeks ago after a public meeting is now making the necessary arrangements.

Those interested in the establishment of a co-operative store, chiefly members of the Fredericton Labor Council, state that stock-subscriptions are pouring in, in a most gratifying manner, and that there appears to be no obstacle in the way of establishing the business.

Upwards of two hundred applications for the position of manager of the cooperative store have been received. Applicants are located in all parts of the Maritime provinces and in many cases have excellent qualifications and much experience. The selection of a manager will be made immediately after the incorporation of the company.

### LUMBER CAMP QUARANTINED FOR SMALLPOX

#### THREE CASES AT FIVE FINGERS, RESTIGOUCHE

Dr. J. A. Wade Returns After Taking Usual Precautions—Province Clear With This Exception.

Dr. J. A. Wade, District Medical Health Officer has returned to Fredericton from Five Fingers, Restigouche County, where he had been called on account of three cases of smallpox. The cases all were in a lumber-camp on the operation of J. D. McLaughlin. The cases were placed under quarantine. All contacts were vaccinated and a quarantine on the camp established. The disease was of the type which has occurred at various times recently in Madawaska and Restigouche counties. There is continuous intercourse between those counties and Quebec and Maine in both of which smallpox is fairly prevalent. The source of these cases is not known. With these exceptions New Brunswick is clear of smallpox as far as the Department of Health is aware.
