THE UNKNOWN DEAD

This week the body of an unknown soldier was brought from the battlefields of France and interred in Westminster Abbey with appropriate ceremony. The body was placed on a destroyer at Boulogne and escorted across the channel by four French and six British men of war ships. On reaching London the body of the unknown hero was placed upon a gun carriage, and a great procession was formed which proceeded to the Cenotaph at Whitehall where a religious service was held. With His Majesty the King acting as chief mourner and generals of the army and admirals of the fleet acting as pall bearers the remains of the unnamed hero were afterwards conveyed to Westminster Abbey and with due ceremony were interred alongside of the greatest of Britain's mighty dead.

A similar tribute was paid to an unknown soldier by the government of France on Armistice Day. The body of a soldier of the republic was disinterred and laid at rest beneath the arc de Triumphant in Paris.

Referring to the tribute paid to the unknown soldier who fought and died for the cause of liberty the New York Herald says:

"To him, representative of those whose immolations have seemed to mankind to end in obliteration, whose virtues and whose sins, whose successes and whose failures have appeared to be engulfed in inscrutable obscurity with the tragedy of death, whose record for their fellows has been rendered void, this supreme entombment will be given."

"Thus to that innumerable company recorded before the world as The Unknown Dead a mighty nation sensible of the eternal verities will pay solemn and enduring tribute."

"That solitary grave will attest the sorrow and the love felt by their fellows for the thousands who, though their names be but traced in water on the parchments of history survive in deeds written in letters of fire on the hearts of grateful humanity."

"To him who sleeps in a splendid isolation there we may say:

"Common man, common soldier, mere unit in a vast aggregation of common men and common soldiers, thou art the firm foundation of all human States and Powers, the creator guardian, defender of Civilization. Little regarded and little regarding life, at death but an entry among The Unknown Dead to you human understanding, heir of Learning, Insight, Experience and Divine Inspiration, proudly dedicates the lasting memorial of all its glory."

William Childs president of the company which operates a chain of high class restaurants throughout Canada and the United States, announces a cut in price on stable articles of food ranging from 11 to 23 per cent. The change will go into effect just as soon as the new menu cards are prepared. An agent of the U. S. Department of Justice has been conducting an investigation of the Childs chain of eating establishments for some days past. that there was to be an upward revision because of the high cost of meats, milk, eggs, etc. Subsequently however, it was announced by the management that price reductions would be made.

Tenders for two more sections of the trunk highway being constructed from Fredericton to Woodstock are being called for by Hon. P. J. Veniot, Minister of Public Works. The first section will extend from Fredericton to the Indian Village and the second from Rossborough to the Barony. It is proposed to proceed vigorously with the work as soon as weather conditions will permit in the spring. The intention of the government is to construct with Federal aid a high class trunk road from Fredericton to Woodstock. A splendid start was made with the work last season and a first class job was done.

Doherty.

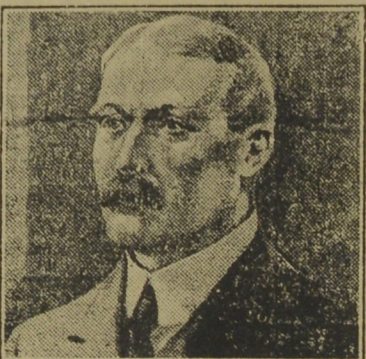

(Continued from Page Five) It was about 9 o'clock. He saw St. Pierre later at the dance. He had on a grey suit.

Other Evidence.

Harvey Delaney, a train despatcher on the Canadian National Railways, said he was in York's drug store on the night of the crime. He boarded over the drug store. He went down to the drug store at 8.30 p. m. and was having a soda with Augustine Finnemore when St. Pierre entered and introduced himself. The witness said he was going to work, and asked Finnemore if he was going along and Finnemore said "Yes." St. Pierre also went towards the post office and the accused and the witness crossed the bridge going in the direction of the Royal Hotel. Delaney said he left St. Pierre at the top of the hill. It was about 8.50 p. m. The witness took St. Francis street to go to the railway office. St. Pierre did not say where he was going. He talked about baseball and later said he was going to a dance. St. Pierre did not have any blood on his clothes. He was dressed neatly.

Dr. F. L. Hebert was next called. On re-direct examination he said there was no hole in the accused's sleeve. There was a spot on the sleeve that the accused said was blood. On a question as to whether the train of his story at the corner's inquest was broken by being asked questions by members of the jury Counsel LeBlanc objected.
