

REV. H. A. GOODWIN MAY BE SECRETARY OF DEPARTMENT

CONSIDERING OFFER OF THAT POSITION

Had Accepted Call from Methodist Church in This City
—Nothing Heard from Him Lately.

Rev. H. A. Goodwin, B. A., who accepted a call from the Fredericton Methodist Church to succeed Rev. G. M. Young as pastor in July next, has been asked to accept the position of secretary for the Maritime Provinces in the Department of Evangelism and Social Service, of the Methodist Church. The authorities of the Fredericton Methodist Church have not heard from him since he accepted the call from this city. It is announced that he has the latest offer under consideration but has not yet announced his decision.

Better Appointment.
The offer of appointment as secretary of the Department mentioned comes from the Methodist Church as a general body and as such would be senior to the Fredericton pastorate. It is understood that the salary attached also is greater.

Pastor at Centenary
Rev. Mr. Goodwin has been pastor at Centenary Church, St. John since 1917. The church is the largest Methodist church in the provinces. He has been very popular in his pastorate there. He was the Baccalaureate preacher here at the closing of the University of New Brunswick this year.

Great Decline in Sugar.

There was a big week-end market today with produce offered in abundance. Prices remained steady with little difference from previous quotations. Eggs sold at 75 cents per dozen butter at 60 cents a pound and potatoes at three dollars a barrel. Meat was abundant at regular prices. Venison sold at 6 to 14 cents per pound. Pickering and other fish were offered.

Regrettable Incident.
During the celebration of Armistice Day Thursday there was a regrettable incident while speeches were being delivered at Parliament Square. While Col. H. F. McLeod was making the formal presentation of the German guns a number of men on the outskirts of the audience persisted in shouting at the speaker. Fortunately their noise was not sufficient to interrupt the speaker.

Go's to Temperance Vale
Maritime Baptist: Rev. R. A. Burrows who recently closed his work at Elgin, N. B., has accepted a call to the Temperance Vale field. Five churches—Temperance Vale Campbell Settlement, East Waterville Nackawick, and Upper Queensbury—are included in the pastorate, so the new pastor will not lack work. His address will be Pinder.

An Unusual Case
St. John Telegraph: The case of an aged man, said to be demented and reported to be handcuffed to a bedpost and under similar restraint for some time, was reported by the police to the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty yesterday. S. M. Wetmore, secretary of the society, accompanied by a clergyman, visited the place in question yesterday afternoon and further developments are anticipated.

Rev. H. T. Crossley Active
Rev. H. T. Crossley and J. H. Leonard concluded a successful campaign last Sunday in Lachute Que. and entered upon another evangelistic effort at Uxbridge Ont., on Sunday last. This will be the third time for Mr. Crossley to be with Rev. G. E. Scott in special services. Rev. Mr. Crossley with the late John B. Hunter conducted lengthy evangelistic services in Fredericton and vicinity in the 90's.

Synod Met in Halifax
The General Interests committee of the Maritime Presbyterian Synod met in Halifax a few days ago and blazed the trail for its activities as the committee whose function it will be to co-ordinate the work of all committees and correspond in the synod sphere with the General Board of the Assembly. Much important preliminary work was done in relation to the Bove Residence in Picton, the church office and church agent synod meetings and Forward Movement. The synod fund will need to be enlarged to meet the growing requirements of the work which falls specifically to the synod Dr. J. S. Sutherland of Fredericton, is convener of the committee.

SIX BOYS IN POLICE COURT ON SERIOUS CHARGE

DAMAGED REAL PROPERTY IN HALLOWE'EN PRANKS

Must Appear With Parents on Monday—Held Responsible for Other Acts, But Not Painting.

The first action by the police in connection with the Halloween depredations was the issuing of summonses for six boys ranging in age from twelve to fifteen years. The boys appeared in the police court this morning. The fathers of two of them also appeared. Police Magistrate Limerick declared that the parents of all the boys must appear in court under the law and for that reason postponed the case instructing the boys to appear again at 4.15 Monday afternoon.

Heavy Penalty Possible
The boys are charged with damaging real property by night an offense for which conviction makes them liable to two years in penitentiary. All belong to prominent and well known families. The offense with which they are charged is the pulling down of fences. It is said the same boys were responsible for opening fire-hydrants and lowering street lamps. Rumor also has connected them with the painting of the Burns statue and certain public buildings on the night of October 29 but Chief Finley says that he does not believe that the boys were in that escapade.

Rewards Were Offered
In connection with the Halloween incidents several rewards were offered. Twenty five dollars was in connection with the offences which these boys are believed to have committed.

COLDEST OF SEASON WAS REGISTERED

THERMOMETER DROPPED 24 DEGREES ON FRIDAY

Steamship People Do Not Expect River to Close Before Another Week—Earliest Dates.

The coldest weather of the autumn was registered last night. At the University the instruments of the meteorological observatory registered sixteen degrees above zero. This was a drop of twenty four degrees since Friday afternoon when the thermometer registered forty degrees above zero.

Snow Stayed On
The snow which fell Friday afternoon and last night being followed by so great a drop in temperature, stayed on but there is not enough to permit the use of runners. It is reported that in some districts there has been sufficient snow for sleighing.

Closing of the River
It is yet too early for the river to close with ice. November 5 is the earliest date for the closing since 1825. On several occasions the ice has formed at dates earlier than this. In the past decade November 15 has been the earliest date. December 18 in 1878 was the latest closing date recorded.

Steamer Movements
The steamship people evidently expect at least one more week of navigation. It is announced that the D. J. Purdy will make her last trip from St. John to this city on Friday the 19th leaving Fredericton on the 20th and that the Majestic will make her last trip from St. John to Cole's Island on the 20th.

Hotels Reaped Harvest
There were six guests in one room in a Halifax hotel during the schooner race period, so insufficient were the accommodations there. The hotel got \$36 a day from that particular room.

Died in Maine
The body of Delancey Booker well known in this city and vicinity has arrived from Lewiston, Me., where his death occurred on Tuesday after a lingering illness. The funeral will take place Sunday from the residence of Mr. Yeomans, Neill Street, Devon. The deceased is survived by a widow and a number of brothers and sisters.

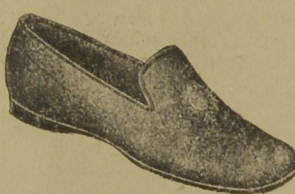
