CHARLOTTE STREET PAVING WILL BE COMPLETED THIS YEAR, IT IS STATED

City Council in Long Session Last Night—Street Matters Discussed at Great Length—No Decision re Larger Stone Crusher and Other Matters—Nelessey of Plan for 1921 Emphasized—Water Rate Arrears Well Cleared Up—Committee on Assessors' Salaries Continued.

The City Council held a lengthy session last night the discussion getting upon permanent pavement and its attendant problems at a late stage. No decision was reached although various opinions were advanced. The cheering information was given by the City Engineer that Charlotte street would be completed this year. A suggestion that a portion of Brunswick have crushed rock placed upon it this autumn was not unanimously approved. There also was varying opinion on the question of getting a larger stone-crusher and of continuing the contract with R. T. Baird.

Other items of interest were the announcement by Ald. Neill that arrears of water-rates up to 1920 had been cleared up except some six who had asked for an extension of two days. Tax collections also were reported to be large for the month of September. The committee on the assessors' application for more salary and that on the employment bureau were continued for another month.

Municipal Home

For the Municipal Home Committee Ald. Baxter reported a total expenditure of \$257.40 of which \$116.25 was for outside relief and \$141.15 for maintenance of the Home.

Ald. Baxter said he could not see why outside relief should cost as much as it did. The Home existed for the purpose of avoiding outside relief. The report was adopted.

Mayor Reid explained that outside relief was largely for assistance to certain families in poor circumstances which could not be placed in the Home.

Tax Collections.

For the Finance Committee Ald. Wilkinson reported on tax collections for September as follows: September, 1919 \$1,987.66; September, 1920, \$6,147.00.

Water-rate Collections.

Ald. Neill, chairman of the Water Committee reported that during the past two months an especial effort to clear up arrears in water-rates had been made. He was pleased to state that with the exception of six ratepayers who had asked for an extension of two days, all arrears in the Water Department had been paid up to the end of 1919. Tuesday afternoon instructions had been issued to turn off water in six cases. It was found necessary to turn it off in but one case the others paying. This made four turned off in all.

Mayor Reid said the report was most satisfactory.

Assessors' Salaries

Ald. Wilkinson presented a communication from the Board of Assessors asking for increased salary. He said it was a rather poor way to do business, to ask for an increase after the work was done instead of making the arrangements before doing the work.

On the motion of Ald. Wilkinson seconded by Ald. Cain the committee on the Assessors' application was continued until next meeting.

Employment Bureau

Ald. Cooper reported for the special committee on the Employment Bureau. He said St. John had turned down the proposition and could see no good reason for establishing the bureau un-

less all cities would go into the scheme. On his motion the committee was continued for a month.

No Delegations

On motion it was decided that at the special meeting to be held October 12 to consider the matter of Street Lighting, no delegations be heard, and no other matter be considered.

Ald. Neill Retracts.

Ald. Neill said he wished to refer to a statement which he had made in committee Monday night. The statement was to the effect that the checking up of the street expenditure by the committee had justified the committee in the belief that the engineer's estimate of \$2.32 per square yard as the cost of tarvia pavement, had been exceeded. It was only fair to City Engineer McDowell and the Street Committee that he retract the statement which was much broader than he intended.

Paving Question.

Ald. Young said that there should be a decision concerning what was to be done in 1921 in permanent pavement. It should be known how much rock would be required.

Ald. Cooper said that the City Engineer wished to know what was to be done. The council should decide what it wished done. If the City Engineer's estimate of \$2.32 per square yard was too low it was the fault of the Council in deciding that certain items should be charged to ordinary expenditure instead of permanent work. There was too much criticism he believed.

Ald. Baxter said that permanent pavement and sidewalks exclusively could be constructed with the bond-issue of \$200,000. Possibly if the Street Committee and the City Engineer received more encouragement, the building of streets would proceed faster, next year there should be assurance that material would be available before a street would be torn up. It was the closing of streets which made the trouble.

Held Up By Indecision.

Ald. Camp said that the Street Committee was held up by the indecision of the City Council in the matter of permanent pavement. If there was to be a curtailment, the old crusher would do the work.

Ald. Neill said that this decision to lay permanent pavement was wise. However sight of the necessity of new concrete sidewalks should not be lost. There was talk of gravel for the streets. He was opposed to that material. It might be all right on light-traffic streets but tarvia or something as good or better should be continued.

Use of Gravel.

Mayor Reid said that he probably was responsible for reference to gravel. He had suggested that on account of the heavy cost of permanent pavement, that gravel be used for temporary repairs on some of the streets. Ald. Wilkinson said that labor and other costs had advanced tremendously since the time the scheme was begun. He would like to see the Street Committee formulate some plan for the future. Why not use some other binder than tarvia? The Imperial Oil Company had a binder. Tarvia would not live out the bonds. Moncton had learned that.

Ald. Young said he had opposed permanent streets on the ground of cost but had bowed to the will of the majority. It might be well to let permanent paving alone and spend money on concrete sidewalks, curb and gutter. The ordinary streets could be kept in fair condition by dragging and patrolling. As they were, they were better than the streets in some neighboring towns.

Shortage of Material.

Ald. Neill said that scarcity of material would interfere with laying concrete sidewalks. Mayor Reid said that if such was the case, it would be well to drop the entire matter.

Ald. Young said that such was his belief. There was no necessity of maintaining an engineering staff with so little work being done.

Ald. Neill suggested placing stone on the blocks of Brunswick street already curbed.

City Engineer McDowell said that could be done and the base allowed to settle during the winter. To put stone on this autumn would require additional crushing facilities.

To Finish Charlotte Street.

To Ald. Cooper the City Engineer said that Charlotte Street could be finished this year.

In response to Ald. Young the City

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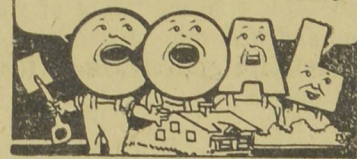
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
