From The Temperance Alliance To The Electors Of New Brunswick

THE AIM AND OBJECT OF THE N. B. TEMPERANCE

The aim and object of the New Brunswick Temperance Alliance since its inception has been the promotion of Temperance Principles. Since its organization it has stood for the elimination of liquor for beverage purposes, and by education and agitation has endeavored That the Crown Land policy of the full claim of the constable who re- to forward and promote this cause. Measure after measure has been influenced by this organization until in 1916 the present N. B. Prohibitory Act was passed by the House of Assembly. This measure became operative on the 1st day of May, 1917. It was adopted and came into force as a war measure and few amendments have been added to it, because of the fact that the people were to be given an opportunity some time after the war to pass their judgment upon it. On the 10th day of July last the Referendum Vote was held and resulted in a tremendous victory being won. The majority favoring the Prohibitory Law was 24,264 and a majority of 18,130 against the sale of light wines and beers. This decisive majority is a clear intimation for the organization to go forward with this work, endeavoring to have the best measure obtainable placed upon the statute books and then insist upon its enforcement. Prohibitory Legislation can only be sustained and enforced as full sympathy is established between those who have the laws placed upon the statute books of our land and those who are entrusted with its enforcement.

Never in the history of the Alliance have we had such a challenge as comes to us today We need a more stringent measure, a much more comprehensive act. This is necessary if we are to obtain the success we have in mind.

Then we have the Resolution dealing with the Referendum, prohibiting the Importation of Liquors into our Province. This should come before the Legislature at the earliest part of the first session. This would enable us to have the vote taken some time the latter part of

To this end all our endeavors should be directed.

The Alliance is depending upon the voters of this Province to elect members to our Legislative Assembly who will uphold the principles of Prohibition. It is of the utmost importance that men be returned who will vote for this referendum. The election of true temperance men who can be relied upon and whose record is clean on this question is especially necessary to the prosperity of the Province, in view of the great industrial development we are now entering upon. We need a sober people to develop our latent resources. need proper enforcement of our Prohibition Act if we are to develop industrially and morally. The business of the Province, our wives and our children demand the upholding of our Prohibitory Law. God and humanity are urging us to finish the task which was so well begun on July 10th. Your vote will count for much in this election. If the right kind of temperance men are elected an era of prosperity, such as the province has never known before, will bless the people. Be sure and vote for true temperance men without regard to party lines.
