"A moose with a 51-inch spread and 22 points was the best of a number of trophies obtained by a party of Americans hunting last week in the province.

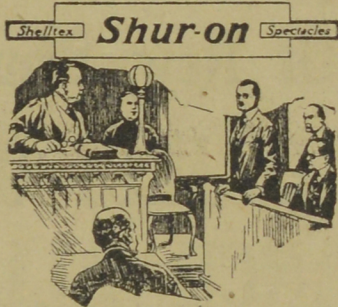
T. J. Canadian, the guide of this party is the son of the celebrated guide, John Canadian. He was conducting C. J. Martin, R. L. Hill, W. K. Mirell, and Edwin Belcher, who are all residents of Miami, Florida, and whose first experience this is of the Northern woods.

"The party set out from Lake Edward whence they portaged to Lake Evelyn in which camp they remained for ten days, leaving on the 30th, September. None of the four hunted big game before; but are all accounted first class shots in their own country.

"They are all accomplished brush turkey and quail hunters and they looked forward with the keenest interest to their first experience of big game. Fortunately luck was good and they are carrying back to Florida impressions which will be a splendid advertisement for the forests of Quebec.

"The bag obtained was as follows: Mr. Martin a moose of 51-inch spread with 22 points, a caribou and a deer. Mr. Hill, a moose with a spread of 48 inches and 18 points, a caribou and a bear. Mr. Mizell got a moose of 47.75 inch spread, with 17 points, a caribou and a deer. Mr. Belcher got a moose of 49 inch spread with 20 points and 2 deer."
