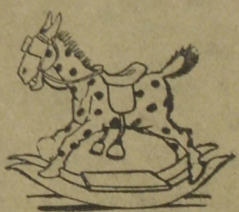

## EDUCATIONAL PROBLEM DISCUSSED BY DR. CARTER

Chief Superintendent a Speaker at the Westmorland and Albert Teachers' Institute—Calls Attention to a World-wide Shortage of Teachers—Moncton Sets the Highest Salary Standard in the Province.

Dr. W. S. Carter Chief Superintendent of Education was one of the teachers at the Westmorland and Albert Teachers' Institute at Moncton last week. The Moncton Transcript reports his remarks as follows:

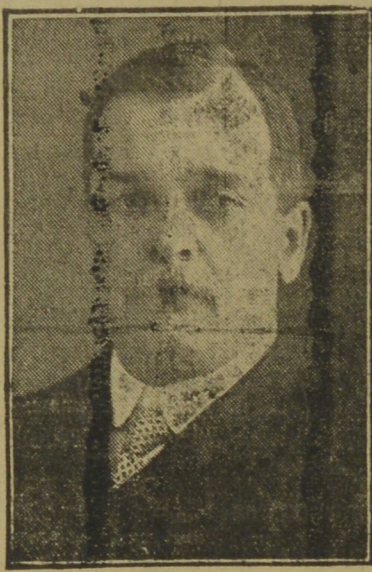
Dr. W. S. Carter, Chief Superintendent of Education, was then called on for an address. Dr. Carter complimented the musicians of the evening and Moncton for its having musical education and for having such a school as the Edith Cavell School. Moncton is no mean city, he said. He could remember when St. John had not many more teachers than Moncton now has. By present appearances Moncton was rapidly gaining on St. John. He regarded Moncton School Board as one of the most progressive. He regretted Mr. Hawke's disability.

Miss Hennessy, of Moncton, who died recently, taught for fifty-two years. When our New Brunswick Teachers' Pension System was enacted it was the best in Canada. But it is now deplorably low. \$400 a dozen years ago is not worth \$200 now. And \$400 is the maximum pension. The New Brunswick Teachers' Association asks that pension be doubled. In my future pension scheme, I thought teachers would have to contribute something. To get a pension a teacher must have taught thirty-four years. No allowance is made for a year or two lacking. The act should have a disability clause giving twenty-fifths of pension for twenty years' teaching; twenty-five thirty-fifths for twenty-five years and so on.

### Compulsory Attendance

He would like to see a more satisfactory Compulsory Attendance Act and have it enforced by the province. Defective children should be looked after as in Vancouver. New Brunswick has about 1600 feeble-minded people, who are a menace to the community.

He would like to have a Trustees Convention. Saskatchewan has had an attendance of 2400 trustees, Manitoba some 800. New Brunswick's response to his invitations for such a convention was so far slow. Such convention in the west have had much influence on educational legislation, and we should have one in New Brunswick. Now that teachers have organized the trustees should also do so. (Great applause.)

which he hoped was only temporary. There is a world-wide shortage of teachers. We may have less than some other places. Every province has a shortage. Nova Scotia's Normal School attendance this year is only half of last year; New Brunswick's is two thirds of the usual—only about two hundred. Our educational standard is in danger. The United States has short 150,000 teachers and has 64,000 teachers under standard. If teachers' salaries were put at \$2,000 today we could not fill the gap over night, as good teachers require time for training. English speaking third class teachers are not supposed to teach in districts of over \$20,000 valuation, for the poor districts must be protected, and also the better trained teachers.

The New Brunswick teachers have organized themselves. Their aim is laudible. Their schedules have been favorably received. The government's special committee had made a minimum salary schedule. The ideal plan would have been to assess the whole province and divide the money between the districts. He hoped that New Brunswick would reach that ideal. It could not be done now because of the badly carried out assessment law. Some countries are assessed ridiculously low. In some places in this province the assessment is avowedly only two-fifths of par. Most cities and towns are parts of their counties, and are badly handicapped by the improper county amounts. We have in New Brunswick forty districts with assessable valuation of less than \$5,000 and 190 with less than \$10,000. First the committee recommended doubling the county fund—increasing it from 30 to 60 cents per head of each county's population. It will have to be put higher. The committee's minima fairly dovetailed with those of the N.B.T.A. The government made the salary of females equal to that of males. That will take about \$75,000 extra from the government, besides the extra \$100,000 from increased county funds.

### Want More Male Teachers

In Alberta a teacher besides salary, is provided with five acres and a cow. Residence for teachers would be a good thing. There should be more male teachers. Every pupil at some time of his or her life should come under a male teacher. Moncton sets the highest salary standard in New Brunswick. More than one male teacher in Moncton is paid \$3,000 a year. The government salary is now the same for men and women teachers.

## CHARLOTTE AND ST. JOHN

St. John Globe: The Charlotte county and St. John county election results are exact parallels down to a point of judicial interference. The fact that the Charlotte county recount established as the St. John city recount to date has established, many errors in the election day returns makes at once apparent the wisdom of a recount when a recount is demanded.

In Charlotte county, as in St. John county the Sheriff who was returning officer, made declaration of the polls as shown by the count of his deputies recorded in their official returns.

In St. John county, on the other hand, the County Court Judge, a very close personal and political friend of Hon. Mr. Baxter declaring one of the trivialities a legal objection to the recount, declined to proceed. The effect of the Charlotte wrong and give the seat where it belonged.
