CANADA AT WASHINGTONS

A report which had its origin in the United States states that the Canadian Government has abandoned its intention of appointing a Canadian plenipotentiary at Washington. A mysterious editorial on the subject appeared simultaneously in a number of newspapers a short time ago, and has aroused a good deal of discussion. The article was as follows:

"There will be no Canadian Minister plenipotentiary at Washington in the near future. This much was decided on at the present visit of Sir Auckland Geddes to Canada. Geddes will continue representing Canada and other British lands.

"The reason back of the withdrawal of Canadian plans was the British belief that if Canada was permitted a special representative Australia and South Africa might ask for similar representation, not only at Washington but in other capitals. Also, it was thought that, granting Canada one minister, the Dominion might want representatives elsewhere.

"British Ambassadors will handle British affairs, and it will not be divided among several Colonial Ministers. No one pretends that this will please the Canadian nationalists, and on the other hand, nobody believes it will put an end to independence agitation in Canada."

In the absence of a definite pronouncement from Ottawa, the reports originating across the line should be taken with a large sized grain of salt.

A GOOD CROP

The best crop any state or nation can raise is a crop of just plain, wholesome boys and girls, says Thrift Magazine. What would be the use of working hard to develop a fine country unless there were some good dependable boys and girls to leave it to? But boys and girls are more difficult to raise than record-breaking cows or fine horses. Sometimes we get so interested in building up a fine farm, or a great city, that we forget to bring up the kind of children that can be trusted with these wonderful investments and enterprises. We cannot leave the boys and girls to grow up any more than a farmer can turn his cattle loose in the neighborhood and expect to have fine stock in the end. The youth must be given high ideals and trained to be honest and dependable men and women. A healthy body can only produce a strong and vigorous mind. By constant effort on the part of parents and leaders, habits of thrift and industry are formed that will insure success. It takes time, trouble and money to raise a good crop of boys and girls, but it is worth it.

The recount of the votes in the St. John city election was completed by Judge Armstrong on Friday. It was found that Ex-Mayor Hayes, the lowest Government candidate, had a majority of thirty over Mr. L. P. D. Tilley, the highest opposition candidate. The proceedings for a recount were instituted by Leader Baxter, with the hope, so it is said, that a saw off might be arranged with reference to the county election, where a recount had been demanded by Mr. Bentley, a defeated government candidate. If this was Leader Baxter's object it failed in its purpose. There was no saw off, nor did the successful government candidates in the city resort to technicalities to prevent a recount from being made. They faced the issue man fashion and won out.

Sydney Bulletin: Given a little money (very little money—in fact, hardly any) and the command of the necessary organizations, the Bulletin, if entrusted with three of Bruce Smith's infant grand-children, would bring them up to be a Protectionist, a Sinn Féiner and an anarchist respectively, and they would be as reliable specimens of their kind as if born in the faith. The fact that their views were absolutely contrary to those inherited from the old man would make no difference, and if there were conversions or defections among them they would be no more numerous than occur in any sect. The power of education, good or bad—the early teaching of truths or lies or gross absurdities—is a marvellous thing.

Halifax Echo: In view of the rapid development of road traffic in Great Britain, an inspection has been carried out over more than one thousand miles of the principal roads, and careful examination made of the experimental lengths which have been laid on various novel systems of construction. It is anticipated that a sum of at least ten million pounds sterling will be spent within the near future on road making and road improvements. British roads have enjoyed the reputation of being the best all-round, in the world, and it is stated that the new methods devised by British road engineers to enable road surface to withstand heavy motor traffic will maintain that reputation.

The first of a series of races between fishing schooners representing the Canadian and American fleets took place off Halifax harbor on Saturday. The American schooner Esperanto won over the Delawana by a margin of eighteen minutes and twenty five seconds. Commodore Stewart of Chatham who is looked upon as a nautical expert payed the way for a defeat by the Canadian schooner a few days ago by pointing out that the Gloucester craft had been fitted up as a yacht. He seems to have had the right dope on the situation. The Delawana certainly failed to deliver the goods, but possibly with a heavier wind, she might make a better showing in the second race of the series.

Voting in the United States presidential elections will take place tomorrow. While elections are always more or less uncertain the general impression is that Senator Harding, the Republican candidate will win. The Democrats have been in power in the great republic since 1912. The late Grover Cleveland, who had two terms, was the only other Democratic president which the nation has had since the Civil War.

Kingston Standard: Government control is a difficult matter as is seen by its being called in question here with regard to sugar and wheat, in Great Britain as to bread, the States as to railways, Newfoundland as to fish, and France as to food generally. Perhaps people will learn to lean less upon Government and more upon themselves.

Chicago unchanged, New York unchanged.

KEGS OF BEER ORDERED TO BE RETURNED TODAY

A Writ of Replevin Served at 2.30 p. m.—Transfer Began Immediately Afterward.

The eighty-one kegs of beer seized from the cellar of Mrs. A. H. Woods on Friday and belonging to the Enterprise Bottling Co., are being returned this afternoon and placed where it was found.

Sheriff J. B. Hawthorne served a writ of replevin on Chief Finley today at 2.30 p. m. before Police Magistrate Limerick who gave permission for the restoration of the beverage.

It is said that Chief Finley forced the cellar at the residence of Mrs. Woods without a warrant and the writ was against him personally. The chief is not in the city today but will be served on his return.

Great Interest.

Considerable excitement has been aroused over the matter as prohibition cases usually do. A considerable crowd had gathered at the Police Station as early as two o'clock but the proceedings were not public, Magistrate Limerick, Sheriff Hawthorne and Policeman Murray being the only ones admitted to the Chief's office.

Outside a motortruck was waiting and the removal of the kegs began almost immediately after Magistrate Limerick left his office.

The firm of Winslow and McNair, acting on behalf of The Enterprise Bottling Co., will carry the case to trial before the courts.
