

JOINT MEETING RE HOUSING DID NOT COME OFF

APPLICANTS UNDER ACT CANCEL APPLICATIONS

Abandonment is Possible, Although Proposition to Build Houses for the City Has Been Made.

The joint meeting between a special committee of the City Council and the Fredericton Housing Commission which was slated to be held last night at the Board of Trade office, did not materialize. One member of the City Council committee attended and three members of the Housing Commission. The others were absentees. Another meeting will be held.

R. H. Simonds secretary of the Housing Commission states that the two applicants who stated their willingness to proceed under the Act with the erection of dwellings, have since notified him that they are unable to put up the difference between the cost of the houses and the government allowance under the Act. This means that there are no applicants for erection of houses in this city although an attempt has been made to make it appear that there is a great shortage of dwellings in this city and a keen demand for them.

Abandonment Possible.

The abandonment of the scheme is possible although the City Council has instructed its committee to take up the proposition of the Commission erecting a number of houses for the city, the latter to dispose of them by sale, rent or lease.

The reason for backwardness on the part of returned soldiers and others who might want to build under the Act is due to the very high building costs. Lumber is said to cost more in Fredericton and immediate vicinity than in other sections of the province and some people are importing it from the North Shore.

The engagement has been announced by Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Murray, 11 Elliott Row, St. John, of their daughter, Dorothy Elizabeth, to Urban J. Sweeney, barrister, of St. John, the wedding to take place July 28. The groom-to-be is well known in Fredericton.

Dogfight Blocked Traffic.

Last night about 8.30 a bulldog and a collie got into a fight at the corner of Charlotte and York streets. The owners attempted to separate them but only succeeded in giving the "bull" a chance to grab the collie by the hind leg, to which it clung with the well-known tenaciousness of the "breed" while a policeman and several others tried to make it release its hold. Quite a crowd collected and traffic was held up for some time.

Fire in Carleton Street

The Fire Department was called out about one o'clock today in response to an alarm from box 34. The fire started under the roof of the house occupied by J. R. Kennedy, Carleton Street, and if it had not been noticed in time might have assumed serious proportions. The double roof interfered with the work of the firemen and the chemical engine and two hand extinguishers were used before the blaze was under control.

Cadet Camp at Sussex.

The Cadet Camp at Sussex will be held from July 19th to July 24th. The boys going from Fredericton will be under the care of J. E. Page, instructor of No. 242 Corps of Fredericton High School. The boys are under no expense but each cadet is asked to supply himself with the following articles:—plate, cup, knife, fork, spoon, towel, soap, change of socks or stockings, change of shoes. They are asked to come in their Cadet Uniforms and to bring any sports equipment that they may have. A good time with a little experience of camp life under tents and good supervision is assured.

Thirty Will Enter.

Final authority has been received from Ottawa in regard to the school teachers and cadet instructors' course which will be held at the St. John Armouries commencing July 19 and ending August 18. The courses of training will be similar to those of a lieutenant of the active militia, with the addition of physical training and semaphore signalling. About thirty persons are expected to take the course. Those who successfully pass examinations will get a certificate as a qualified school cadet instructor, and will be eligible to appointment as officers and as school cadet instructors, which they may hold as long as they act as cadet corps instructors. Upon retirement they may be transferred to the reserve of officers for a period of five years.

Died in the West.

Bassano, Alta., Mail: It was with feelings of very real regret that the town heard the sad news of the death of Mrs. Nutter, which occurred early on Sunday morning. Mrs. Nutter had been operated on for acute appendicitis on Friday, June 18, and had made good progress to recovery. On Friday last unfortunate complications set in and, despite the utmost skill and attention, her condition grew rapidly weaker till at 3.15 a. m. on Sunday, he passed away. Mrs. Nutter (then Miss Turner), came to Bassano in 1914. Her marriage to Charles Nutter in 1917 was an event which joined two of the most popular young people in Bassano. The funeral took place from the Anglican church where the service was conducted by Rev. D. L. Greene. The interment took place at the Bassano cemetery. Mrs. Nutter was a former resident of Fredericton Junction.

FOREST RANGERS WRITING PAPERS IN CITY TODAY

ONE VETERAN OF THE UNITED STATES NAVY

Twelve of Seventeen Candidates Served With C. E. F.—Crown Land Dept. Officers Supervising.

The examinations for Forest Rangers and Scalers began this morning in the Committee Room at The Legislative Building. Seventeen men, all of whom but four are returned soldiers, are writing the examinations under the supervision of R. A. McFadden, Wallace Bridges, G. H. Prince, and A. P. Murchie. In order to become eligible for a position with the Government Ranger it is necessary for a man to pass successfully in both sets of examinations, but those taking the scaling tests only will be granted a certificate, if they make the required showing and will then be allowed to do local scaling in New Brunswick. One resident of the United States is taking the tests this year, Herbert E. Wedgewood, an ex-member of the U. S. Naval Forces.

Twelve Candidates are ex-C. E. F. Men. Following the written and oral examinations this morning the men will be taken to the Victoria Mill, and will there be given an opportunity of doing some test scaling.

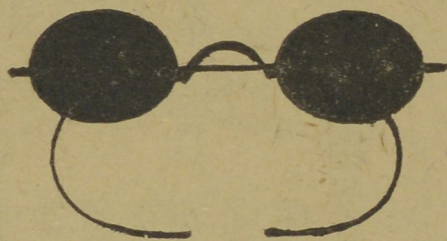

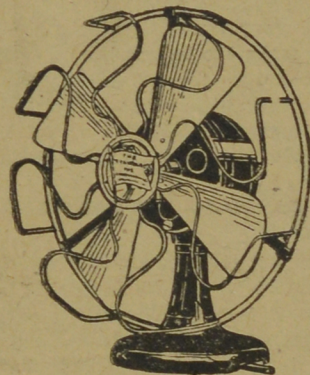
