

## RED CROSS APPEAL WELL RECEIVED

### BELIEVED THAT TWO THOUSAND WAS RAISED

Meeting of Those Interested in the Canvass Will be Held at Board of Trade Rooms Tonight.

Those who were engaged Tuesday in the drive on behalf of the European Relief Campaign for the Red Cross Association, are to meet tonight at the Board of Trade Rooms for the purpose of making returns to the central committee. It is believed that the canvass for funds met with a fair degree of success. Thursday a statement of the result will be published.

It is believed that Fredericton gave about two thousand dollars to this very worthy cause which is a satisfactory result when it is considered that there have been heavy demands made upon the people of the city.

Col. Loggie and Lady Ashburnham both succeeded to a marked extent in the canvass which they made Tuesday. They made special appeals to a number of citizens. In addition there was an organized canvass the city being divided into districts for the purpose.

#### Fined Two Hundred Dollars

The Police Magistrate this morning gave judgment in the case against The Enterprising Bottling Company for keeping liquor for sale in the City of Fredericton contrary to the provisions of the prohibition act. Conviction was made and a fine of two hundred dollars was imposed.

#### St. John Appointment

Major Lawson, St. Stephen, who was in charge of vocational work for soldiers at Fredericton, has been appointed director of vocational training at St. John it has been announced following a meeting in the school trustees offices on Monday night of the vocational training committee of this city. Dr. A. F. Emery, chairman of the board, presided. It was decided to open the vocational classes as soon as organization is complete, and it is expected work will be under way early in the New Year.

#### Twenty-one Years a Bishop

Vancouver World: His Grace, Most Reverend T. Casey, D. D., Archbishop of Vancouver, has attained to his majority as a member of the Canadian Catholic hierarchy, the archbishop having recently completed his twenty-first year as a bishop. The absence of any public recognition of the event it is explained, is due chiefly to the archbishop's recent serious illness, and his desire, following medical advice, to avoid such functions. (His Lordship was pastor of St. Dunstan's in Fredericton when appointed Bishop of St. John.)

#### Minister Cannot Attend

Hon. D. W. Morescau, Minister of Agriculture, will be unable to represent the Department of Agriculture at the Winter Fair at Amherst, N. S., owing to the pressure of other duties. The department will be represented by M. A. McLeod, Acting Deputy Minister, O. C. Hicks who will be one of the judges of cereals, A. T. Floyd, Provincial Apiarist who will have an exhibit of New Brunswick Honey, Ben Gallant and George Thiemens who will be the judges in the Dairy Section and J. H. King Live stock Superintendent.

#### Inspector Kerr's Dismissal

St. John Globe: A published report of a recent meeting of the N. B. Temperance Alliance stated that the government had refused to grant an investigation into the dismissal of Inspector Kerr of the prohibition force, when asked to do so by late Chief Inspector Wilson. Asked about this, Premier Foster stated this afternoon that the government had been asked for an investigation by Kerr but had not been asked by the former chief inspector. The Premier added that in view of the assertion of the Alliance, as reported in the press, the government would consider the question of an investigation.

## LARGE AREA CRUISED BY DEPT. PARTY

### SNOW CONDITIONS BROUGHT PARTY IN

R. D. Jago's Party Covered 536 Square Miles on Tobique and Nepisiguit—Other Survey Work.

All cruising parties of the Department of Lands and Mines have come in. The last party which came in arrived Tuesday from the headwaters of the Nepisiguit and Tobique Rivers. Snow conditions compelled the cessation of work, the snow not being deep enough for snowshoeing but deep enough to interfere otherwise. R. D. Jago was the chief of the party which covered 536 square miles of territory, a large area for the party. The party went into the woods early in May. In addition to the cruising done in that section, G. L. Miller ran 233 miles of lines between timber-blocks.

The other party which was cruising on the Miramichi with F. A. Barkhouse as chief covered 490 square miles. In the same section, H. P. Webb ran 246 miles of timber-block lines.

#### Leased Lands Examined

In addition to this work Crown Lands under lease to C. T. White & Sons of Sussex and the J. B. Snowball Lumber Company of Chatham, were examined during the year. This examination was on a co-operative basis between the department and the lessees.

#### Appointed Chief Forester

H. P. Webb who was with the Department, has been appointed chief forester with the J. B. Snowball Lumber Company. He already has taken up his duties.

L. S. Webb is representing the Department at Spokane, Wash., at a conference on conservation and forestry for the Western States and Canada. He will devote particular attention to airplane patrol and other modern methods applied to forestry.
