SAYS CORNS LIFT
RIGHT OUT NOW

Late Hugh Alward.

A Halifax despatch says: Hugh J. Alward, assistant resident engineer of the marine department, while in the performance of his duties, died, suddenly Tuesday. 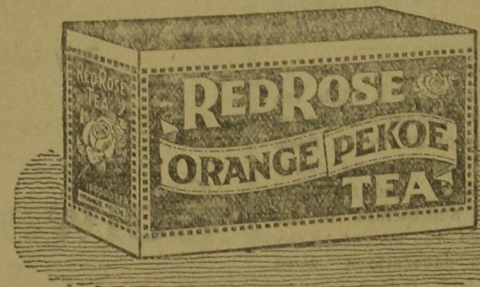
