OF INTEREST TO WOMEN

CARE OF RUGS.

If you have a rug that you are fond of and wish to make last as long as possible—whether it is an Oriental or of domestic manufacture—see that it gets no more of the grime from outdoors than is necessary. You will notice that traffic always inclines to follow certain paths of the floor that are seldom walked upon and others that receive constant wear. The path between two doors is, of course one of these that receive much wear, and the space under a desk or piano chair is another. So when you arrange your floor covering see that the very choice rug does not lie directly in line of this path of heavy traffic.

One of the advantages of rugs over carpets is that they can be rolled up from the floor very easily. Make a point always to have the rugs you prize highly rolled back and kept well out of the way days when cleaning is going on and dust is flying, even though they are to be cleaned themselves before the cleaning is over.

Now, of course, very heavy beating or incessant cleaning even with a vacuum cleaner tends to wear out a rug, but dust and dirt allowed to remain in a rug wears it out much more rapidly. Therefore, never allow the dirt to remain in the rug when it is laid away. Remember, too, that a good rug is made of fast colors and that the best way to clean it is to wash it with water and a mild white soap. So if you get a spot on the rug it is easy to have it cleaned simply by scrubbing it with a little warm water and bland soap.

USE MILK.

Use milk on patent leather to polish, clean and brighten it. Nothing else gives it such lustre and softness.

Use milk to clean piano keys. It removes all dust and grime and does not mar their ivory smoothness.

Use milk to remove ink spots. Wet the ink spot with the milk and keep it wet until the spot disappears. Then wash the spotted fabric in cold water before washing it in warm water. Do not allow the milk to dry—keep adding more to keep it damp. The dried milk sometimes makes a yellow stain that is troublesome to remove.

Use milk to restore the surface of oil-cloth and linoleum. Dip a flannel in the milk and rub the oilcloth or linoleum thoroughly with it. Then rub again with a dry flannel.

Use sour milk for removing freckles. It is the lactic acid in milk that is effective in removing the freckles.

Use milk in the bluing water in which lace curtains that have been washed are dipped. It will give them a finish and freshness like new.

One of the new colors which the dyes have evolved for spring, called "toast" is lighter and thinner than rust color; it appears in lace, in silk net, and in georgette.

New shoes flaunt their colored heels impudently beneath the most severely tailored frocks, some in red others in gray or brown. White low shoes trimmed with bands of varnished black leather also claim attention as one of the season's novelties that will be worn with tailored suits.

Washington, May 18—Gasoline is as necessary for an automobile as food is for a horse, was the ruling of a magistrate in discharging two garage owners of Huntington, W. Va., who were charged with violating the Sunday closing law. They had been arrested on the charge of having sold fuel to motorists in violation of the "blue law."

OLD PICTURES UNDER X RAY

London, May 18—Major G. W. Cook demonstrated at the Royal Institute that X-rays can be used in the examination of old masters which have been painted over by subsequent artists. By an X-ray picture he showed that the figure of the Madonna in an old Dutch master which seemed to be looking at something not existing in the canvas was actually looking at a child which had been painted out.

With the same method he showed that another Dutch painting representing a woman in the act of praying had been painted over the portrait of a monk.

MAKING GOOD

New York, May 18—Figures so far reported this year indicate that the contracts let for concrete pavement in the United States total 17,192,462 square yards, practically double the yardage for the same period last year. Almost every city and town in the country is included with estimates.

REV. DR. CUTTEN MADE IMPRESSION IN TORONTO

Toronto, May 15—"The greatest natural resource that Canada has is the mental and moral stability of her people and the material wealth of her mines, forests and fisheries is useless without the development of her character as a nation," said Rev. George B. Cutten, Ph.D., D.D., President of Acadia University in the commencement address on the "Development of Natural Resources" which he delivered to the 1920 graduating class of McMaster University.

"We are in an awful state of chaos in the world," said the speaker. "What we need is leadership. The world is asking today: 'Where are the leaders? What was needed today, in the opinion of Dr. Cutten were men and women who would translate knowledge into life and develop the qualities and assume the responsibilities of leadership. "We do not know we have no idea where we are going," he said, "we are groping in the dark, and we know not where to get our leaders unless we develop the moral qualities of our people."

Fine Tribute to Women

No country in the world had better material for leaders than Canada, he thought, the character and conduct of the men who had gone overseas indicating the calibre of them. What was needed was to keep the good men at home, to find some means of keeping the brightest and best brains in Canada. To the women of the Dominion the speaker paid a noble tribute. "It is to the women of the Dominion that we owe our success. I believe that they won the war by the training that they gave in the home."

WILLING TO PLEASE.

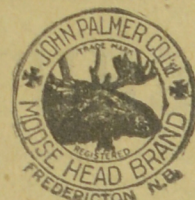

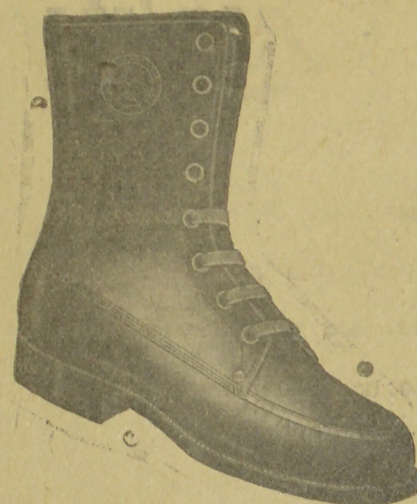

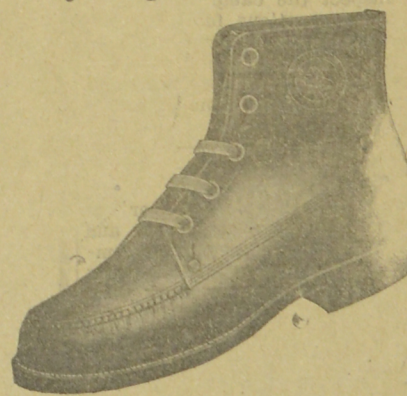
