THE FORDNEY TARIFF HELD UP UNTIL AFTER THE HOLIDAYS

Democratic Opponents of the Measure Score a Temporary Victory—No Effort Will be Made to Rush the Bill—Described as Popgun Legislation.

TARIFF FIFTH PAGE TOP KU opponents of the one year emergency tariff bill on farm products scored a temporary victory in the Senate today in the first real battle over the measure in the upper branch of Congress. They forced Senator McCumber, N. D., acting chairman of the Finance Committee, to announce that no effort would be made to rush the bill from the Finance Committee back to the Senate until after the holidays.

A motion by Senator Hitchcock, Neb., acting minority leader, to refer the bill to the Committee on Commerce instead of to the Finance Committee, on the ground that it was an embargo rather than a revenue measure, was defeated by a vote of 33 to 12. Speaking to the motion, Senators Hitchcock, Neb., Harrison, Miss., and Gerry, R. I., Democrats, assailed the House bill as "the most iniquitous measure ever proposed to Congress," as "popgun" legislation, "vicious in principle and indefensible as either a measure of relief to the farmers or desirable for the best interests of this nation and those with whom we are seeking to trade."

There was a sharp clash between Senators McCumber and Harrison the former accusing Senator Harrison and his associates of filibustering to defeat consideration of the bill.

"I am not objecting to such methods," said Senator McCumber, "for

that is the privilege of the minority if they wish to employ such tactics. But in order to see how far they want to go, I move to table the motion to refer to the Commerce Committee." The motion carried.

Senator Harrison promptly moved to refer the tariff bill to the Committee on Interstate Commerce, in order to be able to get recognition and talk and for nearly an hour delivered a broadside of criticism against the protective tariff system in general and the emergency House bill in particular.

Senator McCumber admitted that the bill was defective and said that in its present form he would not vote for it. After he assured the minority it would not be brought to the floor until after the holidays, they abandoned the fight and let the bill go to committee unanimously.

Late this afternoon Democratic leaders held a conference to consider what further obstacles will be placed in the way of the tariff legislation. They finally decided to await the return of Senator Underwood, Democratic leader, before agreeing on the methods they will employ to oppose the bill. It goes without saying, however, that they will put up the hardest fight possible against it. Whether they will renew their filibuster remains to be seen.

FINE MOVIE SHOW PUT ON AT THE PENITENTIARY DORCHESTER

Warden Meighen Provides a Splendid Entertainment for the Convicts—Many of Them Saw Moving Pictures for the First Time—Musical Programme Also.

Dorchester, Dec. 29—December 29 will long be remembered by every inmate of the maritime penitentiary because of the splendid entertainment provided for the prison population under the efficient and enthusiastic direction of the warden, William Meighen, who, as is probably known is a brother of Canada's prime minister, Right Hon. Arthur Meighen. The entertainment consisted of a display of motion picture films gratuitously supplied by the three St John film firms namely the Famous Players service, the Universal and the Pathe Film Company.

The principal picture was that of the Rocks of Valpre and some other of light comedy. The spacious workshops, known as the tailor shops and boot and shoe-making shop, were completely transformed into a hall, well seated, well lighted, decorated with flags and festooned with mottoes and greenings. On either side of the entrance a specially prepared platform was arranged, one side for the specially invited guests, which included all the clergymen of the town as well as business men and A. B. Copp, M. P. for Westmorland county and on the other side the reserved seats were occupied by the female prisoners with the matrons. The music was supplied by a piano skillfully played by Phillip Albert and by a cornetist from the Salvation Army corps, Amherst, with two noted vocalists from the Salvation Army corps at Sackville.

Prisoners Greet Warden. Messrs. Goad, Palmer, Dobson and Chief Keeper Elsdon of the prison staff, also sang with great acceptance. The first slide bore these words "Comrades, knowing of the feeling of appreciation and good will we all have for 'Square Deal' Meighen, our warden, all together three hearty cheers and God bless him." This called forth a mighty cheer, from the prison inmates, numbering 320.

During the afternoon Warden Meighen spoke very feelingly to the prisoners, commending them in highest terms for the splendid brand of good order and decorum, and assured them that his every endeavor would be made to provide a similar entertainment at different intervals. L. R. Culiven and Oliver Emery, of St. John, co-operated in making the selection of films. Edward M. Emery, of the staff also rendered valuable assistance. This is the first time in the history of the Dorchester institution that an entertainment of this kind has been attempted, and the result has been in a pre-eminent sense successful. A. B. Copp, M. P., delivered a brief but most felicitous address. Cups of hot cocoa with sandwiches and cookies were served the visitors

after the entertainment, and the warden provided teams for the conveyance of the visitors and press representatives back to town. It was a red letter day for all concerned and Warden Meighen is deserving of all praise. The influence of the entertainment on the prisoners was most wonderful. Many of the long-timers were filled with wonderment, never having seen a motion picture before.
